TALK GIVEN ON DUTY OF TROOP LEADERS

Boys Submit Reports on Activities of Weekly Meetings

This week saw two Boy Scout troops re-organized, the Kirk and Knox troops and the Kirk pack. Today the Scouts were to assemble for a grand council fire at East Saint John, in charge of District Scoutmaster O. J. Lawson assisted by the other district leaders. A great time was looked forward to by the boys. One troop this week received its number, the Portland United Troop under supervision of E. H. Little. This week Troop No. 19 as well as Pack No. 18 both of St. James, did not meet on account of the celebrating of the 75th anniversary of the starting of the church. The Victoria street Baptist troop have started a patrol leaders' conference of their own and on Wednesday evening this conference was well attended and was favored by an interesting lecture from Assistant District Commissioner P. C. Choppin.

WORD TO LEADERS

Addressing troop leaders or those who may become troop leaders, District Scoutmaster O. J. Lawson says: "You troop leaders have been given a chance. When a scoutmaster has been called away on your troop meeting night is he able to feel that he is leaving the troop program in reliable hands. I always consider the troop leaders' position important in the troop and he should be relied upon to do the duties well. As you troop leaders know you are not only in the making of every boy in the troop a real scout. It is no use having one or two real scouts in the troop and a dozen who are not living up to the standard."

The most important part of the example set by you. Show them that you obey the orders given to you and that you are living up to the standards that you are able to get badges for proficiency; then the boys will with very little persuasion follow your lead. THE QUALIFICATIONS

"Before qualifying I would like to give you the qualifications of a troop leader. Have a general knowledge of the Boy Scout Handbook for Canada. Have the ability to take charge of the troop. Have at least six months' service as a patrol leader. Must be qualified as a first class Scout."

"My next talk will be on 'A Scout'. There are still no troops which have accepted the challenge of No. 4 Scoutmaster for the football cup this year. Please phone the secretary if you wish to compete."

BADGE REQUIREMENTS

Requirements for the Wolf Cub Instructor's Badge are:

A Scout must serve six months as a Scout instructor in the Pack. Must have ability to take charge of a pack and, if necessary, of the Pack. Must attend several Cub hikes and take an active part in the leadership of the same. Must have a knowledge of the Cub Handbook.

On Monday evening a game was played, followed by other regular practices. Next was a game on compass points in which every boy participated successfully. District Scoutmaster O. J. Lawson was given a hearty reception. He gave a very interesting talk on Scouting. A point stressed was the duties of a troop leader. The district scoutmaster said that he was very much pleased with the way things were run in general and he conducted an examination, on tests of every boy in the troop. This troop now has 13 second class Scouts, two first class, one tenderfoot, two recruits and about five boys almost ready to pass the first class tests. One boy holds his Grade "A" all round card. This is the third cord the troop has won.

FORMER KAISER'S MOVES SUBJECT OF DELIBERATION

Council of Ambassadors to Make Ruling on Big Issue Within Week

PARIS, Oct. 22—Saturday, Oct. 30, the Prince of Wales and President Doumergue will inaugurate a new Canadian House in La Citie University de Paris as the first of a score of similar foreign dormitories which the nation is building or planning for its large international university founded since the war.

This dedication forms the chief reason for the Prince's coming visit to Paris and a large group of Canadian, French, British, and American notables is expected to attend the impressive ceremony.

The full choir was in attendance and the music was very beautifully rendered. The anniversary observance will conclude with special Thanksgiving services on Sunday when Rev. Canon G. Osborne Troop, a former rector, will be the preacher.

23 Confirmed In St. James' Church

The sacrament of confirmation was administered to a class of 23 candidates in St. James' church last night by His Lordship Bishop Richardson. The candidates were presented by the rector, Rev. H. A. Cady, and there was a large congregation present.

The confirmation service was part of the observance of the church's 75th anniversary and Bishop Richardson prefaced his address to the candidates by extending hearty congratulations to the congregation in having its foundations so well and strongly laid in the past. He also extended congratulations upon the general renovation of the church, declaring St. James to compare very favorably with any of the churches in the city. The Bishop gave an earnest and impressive exhortation to the candidates.
