DEPARTMENT TO FOLLOW UP EXAM. PAPER THEFTS

Education Board Approves
Action Taken in Normal
School Scandal

FREDERICTON, June 11.—The Board of Education this afternoon received a report from Dr. W. S. Carter, chief superintendent of education, concerning the theft of examination papers in the Provincial Normal School on Tuesday night during the teaching license examinations, and considered the matter. The action taken so far by Dr. Carter and officials of the Department of Education was approved and instructions were issued for the investigation to be continued.

FREDERICTON ASKS HIGHWAYS GRANT

At yesterday's session of the provincial cabinet a delegation from the City of Fredericton appeared and asking that the province contribute towards the construction and maintenance of such portions of the trunk highways as pass through the City of Fredericton. The matter was laid over for the next meeting of the government, which will likely be held the last of the month.

A similar proposition was placed before the government some time ago by the town of Shediac but no action was taken in the matter.

The proposition that the province pay a share of the cost of laying and maintaining stretches of the provincial main trunk roads where they pass through incorporated towns and cities has been mooted before, the stand of the corporations being that the province is collecting taxes from vehicle

RECORD CATCH OF SALMON AT BANGOR

Fish Avoid Down River
Weirs and Make For
Pools Upstream

BANGOR, Me., June 11.—The Penobscot river salmon continue to give the down-river weirs and nets the go-by and swim up the 25 miles or so of the river to the rapids below the water-works dam, known as the Bangor pool, where they are making the greatest sport for the fly-fishermen know in the history of the river. The catch today up around 15 fish a day at the pool, beating all known records, and about as many are taken in all the weirs which are having a very poor run. No one can seem to account for it. The most of the fish are taken by veteran anglers from their boats a few rods off shore, the fish usually being landed on the beach, but a number have been taken by casting from the shore.

OFFER IS RECEIVED FOR GORDON FOXES

Cleveland Man Would Give
\$525 Each For 30 Pairs
With Pups

BANGOR, Me., June 11.—The receivers of the Frank H. Gordon Inc. silver-black fox enterprise, who have been feeding and caring for some 3,000 foxes on the ranches at Lincoln since last fall pending the settlement of the affairs of the concern, have so far failed to find any customers willing to pay \$250 or more, the court appraisers' valuation on the stock. But there is a sale in sight if the court will allow a shade in the price. A petition has been filed asking that the receivers be allowed to close a deal with a Cleveland, Ohio, man, who offers \$525 a pair for 30 pairs, together with 120 pups, the purchaser to pick them out of one specified ranch.

LETTER FROM PALACE

A letter was read from Buckingham Palace expressing His Majesty's thanks for message of condolence received at the time of the death of his mother, Queen Alexandra.

The executive will bring forward a resolution to the effect that "the National Council of Women deplors the serious articles which have appeared from time to time with the apparent intent to belittle the royal family and outstanding British statesmen and while hesitating to further the obvious desire of the publishers for undue publicity, we reaffirm our stand as definitely opposed to the entry into Canada of such degrading reading matter."

MEXICO CITY, June 12.—Japan swept victoriously through the first two matches with Mexico here yesterday, in the American League competition for the Davis Cup. Takekichi Harada, of Japan playing brilliantly, defeated A. Unda, his Mexican opponent, in straight sets, 6-2, 6-4, 6-4. The second match between Teizo Toba, of Japan, and Manuel Llano, was won by the former, 6-1, 8-6, 7-5, 6-2.
