JURY SAYS DEATH WAS ACCIDENTAL

Verdict Returned in Matter of Fatal Street Car Accident.

The inquest into the death of George Gallant, of Britain street, who died a few days ago in the General Public Hospital as a result of injuries received when struck by a street car at the corner of Britain and Charlotte streets, about two weeks ago, was concluded in the Court House last night before Coroner A. F. Emery.

Several witnesses were examined and the jury, after deliberating thirty-five minutes, returned a verdict to the effect that George Gallant came to his death by being accidentally struck by a street car in Britain street on the morning of October 26, and that no blame attached to the driver of the street car.

The jury was composed of R. T. Warden, foreman, E. J. Todd, C. E. Farrand, George H. McLaughlin, Cornelius Deven, John L. Cambridge and William Crabbe.

Paul C. Quinn was present in the interests of Mr. Gallant's widow, at the instance of the Longshoremen's Association, while H. H. McLean, Jr., represented the New Brunswick Power Company.

Evidence was given by James Merritt, Policeman Frank Corvee, Policeman John McElhinney, Dr. Charles P. Inches, and Dr. O. B. Evans, internist at the General Public Hospital, Bayard Wilson, Herbert Newton, Cecil McPhee and Frank Fladen, motorman in charge of the car.

Coroner Emery addressed the jury, after which they retired to bring in their verdict.

"BILL" MAYNES IS COMING FOR MEET

Sensational Runner will Participate in Maritime Indoor Championships.

"Bill" Maynes, St. John sensational young flyer, will appear at the Maritime indoor championship meet at the Arena next Friday night under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A. He will compete in the 440 and 880 under the colors of St. Francis Xavier where he now is an upper-classman.

Maynes undoubtedly will prove a strong drawing card. It will be his first appearance here in St. John since that wonderful finish he made in the Canadian track and field championships at Halifax last September in the 440 yards when after being set back ten feet, Johnson, of Montreal, barely breasted the tape ahead of him. Snapshots of that finish would almost lead one to believe that Maynes won. He finished strong while Johnson plainly was in distress.

It has been announced that Maynes will go to the Olympic tryouts at Montreal next spring and his many friends here feel confident that he will win the 440 event easily and make the trip to Paris, along with "Zack" Miller, of Sussex, who is a sure fixture for the team, barring accidents. Maynes is competing in an intercollegiate meet at St. F. X. on Monday night. According to latest advice Maynes will not arrive here until next Friday. He will be in good shape, however, in all probability, he will have "Barney" Francis, P. E. I.'s great runner as opponent, although Francis may elect to confine his efforts to the mile and the three-mile. One of his opponents in the 440 probably will be Frank Campbell, Maritime 100-yard champion. It is not known whether Charles Gorman will compete or not. "Charlie" did well at last year's meet and may take this means of keeping in trim for the coming speed skating contests.

With Maynes, Miller, Gorman, Francis and Campbell heading the bill it is not too much to presume that the indoor meet promises to be one of the greatest ever held here.

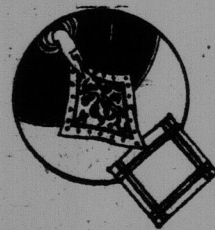

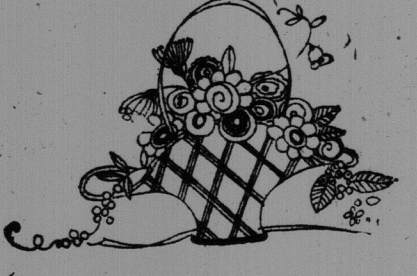

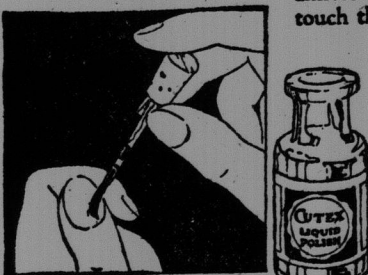
