let them, he said, be quite sure there was not in the British Empire a more certain means of securing swift and certain returns. In future they would need to draw more from imperial resources, and as the years passed this process would conduce to the greater strengthening of the British position.

They were well advised to repose themselves confidently on the broad security of the empire. If that failed, there would be little else in any part of the world. If it stood, the money invested in the great overseas plantations of the dominions would return, bringing with it means for future enterprise. If they had patience, courage, resolution and wisdom the dark days would pass away and they would live to see the dawn of another era as splendid, peaceful and prosperous as that in which their fathers and grandfathers were fortunate enough to live.

Sir E. Walton, South African high commissioner in London, said the dominions fully shared Mr. Churchill's confidence in London to supply their financial requirements and had no intention of going farther afield for loans.

In conclusion, Sir Walton uttered a warning in regard to the British tenders for railway and other engineering work, which he declared were still higher than aforeign tenders. This rendered difficult the expenditure of loans raised in Great Britain by the dominions upon British products as the people of the dominions preferred.


