Babe Ruth Penalized.

Chicago, May 26—Babe Ruth was fined \$200 and removed from the captaincy of the New York American club by Ban Johnson, president of the American League, this afternoon.

President Johnson gave his ruling after considering the reports of the umpires officiating in yesterday's game at New York between New York and Washington when Ruth disputed a decision of Umpire Hildebrand and later climbed into the stand after a fan had made a remark to which he took exception.

President Johnson's finding automatically removes the ruling that Ruth was ineligible to play, which was promulgated by the American League head pending an investigation.

Jersey Bats Big Bout.

New York May 27—A world's heavyweight championship bout between Champion Jack Dempsey and Harry Wills, New Orleans colored heavyweight, will not be tolerated in New Jersey, nor will a bout between Dempsey and Jess Willard, former champion, unless Willard convinces the boxing authorities of the Skeeter State that he can attain a measure of physical condition which would justify element of competition in such a bout. This was declared by Louis J. Messano, chairman of the New Jersey Boxing Commission.

"No permit will be granted for a bout between Dempsey and Wills," said Chairman Messano, "because I do not think there is a public demand for such a bout. There will be no permit issued either for a Dempsey-Willard bout, unless Willard can satisfy the commission that he is in good physical condition. Willard is a man well on in years, and has been out of the ring for three years. Because of this it seems improbable that he can again attain formidable fighting form. Unless Willard is in good shape a match would be an uninteresting, one-sided spectacle."

Draw With Champion.

OPPOSES COLLEGE AMALGAMATION

Sir Douglas Hazen Against
Merger of U. N. B. With
Other Maritime Universities.

At a reception held last evening in the auditorium of the High school for the U. N. B. Club of the city for the graduation classes of the St. John and St. Vincent's High schools, Sir Douglas Hazen expressed strong opposition to the idea of the inclusion of the U. N. B. in the proposed merger of the colleges of the maritime provinces. One result of the amalgamation, he said, would be that New Brunswick would be left without a seat of higher learning. Every other province had one and New Brunswick should retain hers. He doubted whether the centralization idea would be a success so far as this province was concerned. Arthur N. Carter, B. A., a graduate of the High school and of the U. N. B., which latter institution he represented as Rhodes scholar at Oxford, referred to the notable careers of many men from the maritime provinces. E. C. Weyman, president of the U. N. B. Club in the city, also spoke briefly.

At the conclusion of the addresses a programme of dances brought to a close a very pleasant evening.

MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES

Peter A. LeBlanc, an employee of the C. N. R. and a former member of the 26th Battalion, was killed on Tuesday afternoon at Athol, Restigouche county, when he was caught between two cars he was coupling. The funeral was held yesterday morning.

Fire which broke out in South Bathurst on Wednesday threatened to assume serious proportions for a time, but was confined to a house and barn, which were destroyed. The damage is estimated at \$8,000, of which \$1,000 is insured.

High Parker, of Doaktown, was drowned at the boom at Athol recently. He was working on the boom and slipped into the water when no one was near him. His body was not recovered for nearly fifteen minutes and it was then found impossible to resuscitate him.

After being fugitives from justice for over eighteen months, three brothers, Allen, John and Murdoch McLellan, were lodged in the county jail at Sydney, charged with assaulting passengers and raising a rough house on the steamer Aspy in November, 1920. A man named McIsachern, also wanted, is still at large.

The arrests were made at West Cove after the police had made a long trip through the woods. They were brought to Sydney.

A meeting of the ratepayers of St. Martin's school district No. 2 was held on Tuesday to consider the question of building a school in place of the one destroyed by fire a few weeks ago. It was finally decided to build a four department building, but definite plans were not made.

At the session of the New York State

Council, Knights of Columbus, yesterday at Oswego, resolutions were adopted, that J. C. Feltier, of Boston, supreme advocate of the order, be removed from office in the order. Further proposal was made that J. A. Fishery, supreme knight, and J. B. Kennedy, editor of Columbia, be censured for publicity given in connection with the Feltier case.

POLE WRITES PRIZE ESSAY
AFTER A YEAR OF ENGLISH

New York, May 27—Unable to speak or understand a word of English when he came here from Poland a year ago, S. Danblaski, twenty-two, has won the bronze medal awarded by the National Society of Colonial Daughters of Washington for the best patriotic essay in English submitted to it. Danblaski, reads and writes English fluently. He worked at odd jobs to support himself while attending night classes three times a week.

The essay considered second best was on "The Washington Conference," by Adolph Boura of Bessarabia, and the third best, "Americanization," by Feiga Brand, a young Ukrainian woman.

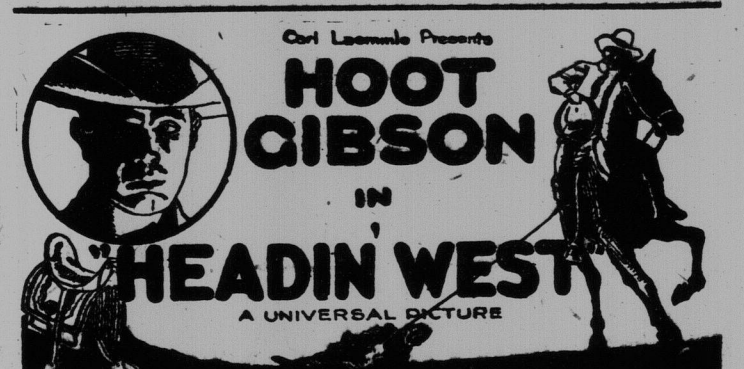

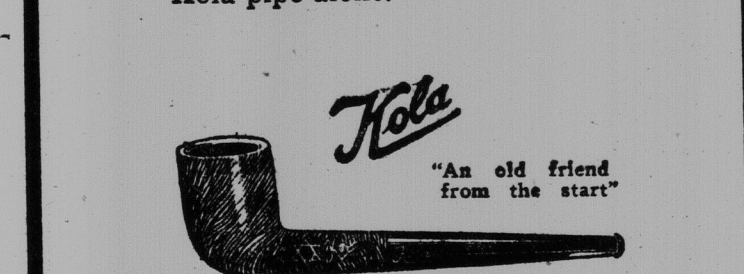
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
