## MONUMENT TO AMERICANS KILLED WITH FRENCH ARMY

Paris, Oct. 31.—(Associated Press Correspondence)—General Mangin is organizing the task of obtaining subscriptions for a magnificent monument to the American volunteers who fought with the French army, to be set up in the Place des Etats-Unis.

The monument is to be by a well-known French sculptor, Boucher, and will cost \$100,000. No foreign subscriptions will be accepted; all donations must come from French sources.

Once a year a military ceremony will be held before the statue and after a funeral march has been played, the officer in command will read out of a golden book the names of the dead volunteers. To each name the response will be given—"Dead on the field of honor." The Last Post will be sounded and the French soldiers will march past the statue and present arms.

## IMITATION JEWELS IN BRITISH COLLECTION

London, Oct. 31.—(A. P. Correspondence)—Sir George Young, husband, keeper of the Jewel House at the Tower of London, has just revealed the fact that one of the British crown jewels, of which he is custodian is an imitation. The stone was believed to be a magnificent aquamarine, but proved on examination to be only a piece of colored glass. It figured first in the crown of King James II. The mystery of when the imitation was substituted for the real stone has not been solved.
