RECENT DEATHS

Sir Rodolphe Forget.

Montreal, Feb. 20.—Sir Rodolphe Forget, the wealthy banker and promoter, died at his home here last night after an illness of five weeks. He was formerly member of parliament for Charlevoix and in 1911 declined an appointment to the cabinet of Sir Robert Borden. He was reputed to be several times a millionaire.

George R. Sangster.

Moncton, N. B., Feb. 20.—George R. Sangster died at the home of his son, John B. Sangster, this evening. He was a native of Falmouth, N. S., and had been a resident of Moncton forty-four years. He was in the 80th year of his age. For many years Mr. Sangster conducted the I. C. R. restaurant in the Moncton Depot, but retired from the business twenty years ago and was succeeded by his son. He was a prominent Mason. He was prominent in the Wesley Memorial Methodist church. He is survived by two sons, John B. Sangster and Lewis, of the C. G. R., Moncton, and one daughter, Mrs. G. M. Clark of Brooks, Me.

Mr. Forget was first married to Marie Alexandra Tourville, daughter of the late Hon. Louis Tourville, M.L.A., October 12, 1885, his second marriage was with Marie Louise Blanche MacDonald, daughter of the late Robert MacDonald, superintendent of the Intercolonial railway, April 22, 1894. He was the father of five children, three sons and two daughters. Sir Rodolphe Forget was created Knight Bachelor, January 1, 1912.

ARREST OF KAISER'S SON AT SAME TIME AS MUNICH OUTBREAK

Basel, Feb. 21.—A reactionary insurrection broke out at Munich on Wednesday night, according to the Frankfort Zeitung. Demobilized Bavarian bluejackets attacked the Diet House and occupied the telegraph office and police headquarters but were eventually dislodged by government troops.  
Prince Joachim of Prussia, sixth son of the former emperor, was arrested, it being reported that he apparently had some connection with the movement. He has been staying at Munich under the name of Count Merz. The government has announced that it has taken the necessary measures to protect the Diet and punish the persons responsible for the uprising.

JAMAICANS SEEKING UNION WITH CANADA

London, Feb. 21.—A despatch to the Morning Post from Kingston, Jamaica, says the Council of Montego Bay, the second town of the island, has unanimously resolved to ask the government to bring about confederation with Canada, owing to the increased cost of products passing through American clearing houses to Canada, especially as Canada is not connected with any tropical countries from which to draw materials.

WAR HIGHWAY AS MEMORIAL

A Suggestion That is Finding Favor Among P. E. Island People

Charlottetown, P. E. I., Feb. 21.—Among suggested war memorials for P. E. Island is a great war highway, says the first Charlottetown, Summerside and Borden and eventually extending from end to end of the province. This highway was suggested by Corporal R. L. Cotton, who recently returned from overseas. Some business men already have subscribed towards it. It is suggested that we should have in every county at the principal centre of the highway a memorial hall built of Island stone of suitable size for lectures and educational purposes with glass cases containing souvenirs from the battlefields.

It is pointed out that under the proposed federal highways bill, Canada will provide forty per cent. of a permanent roadway. Among the contributors to the highway are Holman & Company of Summerside, \$1,000.

The secretary of the G. W. V. A.—Corporal Lowther, M. M., and other members of the organization advocate as a memorial a club house in Charlottetown for returned soldiers. Still another suggestion is that the present armories be enlarged and improved so as to contain also a soldiers' home or club. An objection against the home idea is that at the end of say three years when matters have settled down to normal little interest will be taken in this home even by the boys themselves.

THE FRENCH SENATE

Demand for Proceedings Against Humbert—War Investigation

Paris, Feb. 21.—Antonin Dubost, president of the senate, communicated to that body yesterday a demand from the military governor of Paris that the senate authorize legal proceedings against Senator Charles Humbert on a charge of corrupting officials.

The senate adopted a resolution calling for the appointment of a committee to investigate the conduct of the war.

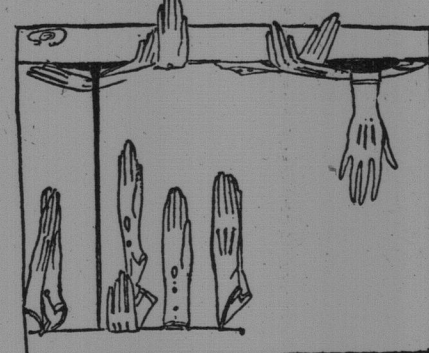
