The public schools in the city and through the province will close for the Easter holidays on Thursday afternoon and will remain closed until the following Wednesday.

THEIR CHILD DEAD.
Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Wallace of 46 Guilford street, West End, will have the sympathy of many friends in the death of their little daughter, Edna May, aged nine days. She died on Saturday and was buried in Cedar Hill this afternoon.

A YEAR BEHIND.
J. Fraser Gregory, Frederick S. Crosby of this city, and Albert A. Fowkes of Moncton have been reported by the police for driving their automobiles through the city yesterday without having the 1913 tag and numbers on them.

BURIED TODAY.
The funeral of Mrs. William Merrick was held this afternoon from her late residence in Brussels street to the Cathedral, where the burial service was read by Rev. M. O'Brien. Interment was in the old Catholic cemetery.

ALL BETTER.
The last of the small-pox patients confined in the isolation hospital on the Sandy Point Road, was released from the institution last evening fully cured. There is not a case of small-pox now in the city.

OCEAN LIMITED.
The *Ocean* Limited was again placed in service on the N. C. B. today. It will run in future between Halifax and Montreal, and not out of St. John, connection being made from here by the Atlantic leaving at 12.40.

DIVORCE CASE.
Before Judge McKeown on Saturday in the divorce court here a short session was held at which evidence was given in the divorce proceedings of King vs King. This is an undefended action brought by the wife against her husband who has been living in Victoria, B. C. Smith appeared for the appellant. Adjudgment was made without any definite time being mentioned.

HOME FROM NEWCASTLE.
Hon. R. J. Ritchie returned to the city this morning after a week-end visit to Newcastle where he was the guest of Mr. and Mrs. John W. Miller. While there he addressed a mass meeting in the opera house on Wednesday evening, and his talk, "Be Ye Sober," there was a large audience. In speaking of his trip, Hon. Mr. Ritchie said the North Shore appeared to be in the grip of winter, there being between four and five feet of snow on the ground.

MAY BE WARNING.
A young man employed by one of the steamship lines was arrested at the East Side Ferry boats on Saturday evening charged with being drunk. He unfortunately fell off a seat in the ferry waiting space and was badly cut in the face. He was taken to hospital, and released from custody on a deposit of \$8. He appeared in the court this morning and the magistrate fined him \$5 and warned the prisoner against drinking.

COMMISSIONER McLELLAN HAS DECIDED TO RUN

Definitely Announces That He is Candidate For the Mayoralty

Commissioner McLellan will offer as a candidate for the office of mayor at the coming civic elections and will not resign his present office to do so. This announcement was made this morning by the commissioner, and a definite statement which has been awaited with interest since the rumors of the possibility of his taking this course have been in circulation. His nomination papers have been prepared and signed but will not be filed until tomorrow.

If no other candidate appears, and there seems to be no prospect of any others, there will be no vote for mayor at the first election and this leaves Commissioner McLellan three weeks for his campaign, which he promises to make an interesting one.

There has been speculation regarding the possibility of the commissioner continuing to hold office while running for another office but there seems to be nothing in the city charter to prevent his doing so. It is understood that Mr. McLellan secured legal advice on the matter before making his decision and was assured of the legality of his course.

Mr. McLellan filed his nomination papers as candidate for commissioner this afternoon. This makes a list of nine nominations including Commissioners Angus and Wilmore and Messrs. Allingham, deForest, Fisher, Jones, Potts, Russell and Sargis. Messrs. Brown, Belyea, McIndeffick and Spooner have not yet filed their papers.

MRS. STEVENS DEAD; MRS. LIVINGSTONE CALLED TO PORTLAND

Head of National W. C. T. U. Passed Away Today at the Age of Seventy

On account of the death of Mrs. L. M. Stevens, the president of the National Women's Christian Temperance Union, which occurred in Portland, Me., today, Mrs. Debra Knox Livingston has been obliged to cancel the remainder of her engagement in St. John and will leave tonight for Portland. This is greatly regretted, as Mrs. Livingston, both on her present and former visits to St. John, created a very strong impression by her public addresses. She gave a talk to the pupils of the High School this afternoon. It has been suggested that some of those interested in the proposed Social Act campaign that Mrs. Livingston be asked to return to the city for a series of addresses at a later date.

Referring to the death of Mrs. Stevens a despatch from Portland, Me., says: "Mrs. L. M. Stevens, president of the National Women's Christian Temperance Union, died today. She had been ill for several weeks with kidney trouble. Mrs. Stevens, who was born in Davis, Me., seventy years ago, continued to the last the temperance work to which she had devoted most of her life. Her mind remained clear and late last week, she was able to dictate correspondence in connection with the duties of her office."

WATCH THIS BILL

Where Does St. John Stand in This Foreshore Legislation?

The attention of the St. John city and county members of the legislature has been drawn to the bill which has been given its first and second readings in the house and which provides that the province may lease the foreshore rights on any tidal waters. A statement has been made by the city recorder that St. John is not affected by this bill but, until its provisions are more fully known there are many citizens who are anxious.

The foreshore rights in Courtenay Bay are now, or are likely to become, a matter of dispute between the city and county and the Norton Griffiths Company and there is a feeling of anxiety about anything that would weaken the position of the municipality.

The bill will come up for the third reading tonight and the local members have been warned to look out for any infringement upon the rights of their constituency and examine closely into the real motive of the legislation.

WILL OF L. D. BEATTEY IS PROBATED TODAY

In the probate court today the will of Isaac O. Beattay, undertaker, was proved. He gives all his property to his wife Hannah, mostly absolutely, but a portion after her decease to go to his son, Frederick C. Beattay, and his daughter, Minnie B., wife of Walter B. Brown, of Montreal, assistant superintendent of C. P. R. terminals, his only children, and he nominates his wife and son executors. They were sworn in. Real estate \$8,700; personalty \$8,800; total estate \$17,500. Barnhill, Ewing & Sanford are proctors.

In the matter of the estate of Mrs. Mary Jane Peters, widow, the executor, Chief Justice McLeod and John W. Sharpe, boarding-house keeper, filed their accounts with a petition to pass them. A citation was issued returnable May 4 at 11 a.m. Barnhill, Ewing & Sanford are proctors.

Tenders for residium oil, road oil, tar and asphalt for the department of public works will be opened at the weekly meeting of the common council this afternoon.

The commissioner of harbors will recommend that the Maritime Dredging Company be given a lease of Nelson Slip, West St. John, for the storage of timber and the construction of cribs upon the same terms as enjoyed by Connolly and Charleson at \$885 per annum. Commissioner McLellan will submit the annual report of the department of public safety.
