Daily Hints for the Cook.

INEXPENSIVE EPUDDING.

One half cup shortening, one cup milk, one cup cold water, two and a half cups flour, one level teaspoon soda, one half level teaspoon each of cinnamon and cloves, one fourth level teaspoon mace, one cup raisins seeded and cut in two. Melt the shortening, but do not heat it, and the molasses and the water; then the flour sifted with the soda and spices. Add the raisins, beat well and turn into a mold or one pound baking powder cake, and steam for three hours. Serve with hot sauce or hard sauce.

BAKED STAKE.

Butter the dripping pan and put in the steak, cut about one inch thick. Cut an onion over top, season with salt, pepper and butter. Bake in a quick oven for about 15 minutes. Then make a sauce by straining the juice from a can of tomatoes and thickening with a little flour. Season with salt, cayenne pepper and a teaspoonful of sugar. Bring to a boil and pour over steak when ready to serve. A club, round or sirloin steak may be prepared in this way.

CELERY TIPS.

Celery is sometimes very scarce, and a very good plan is to save the tops of the celery this time of the year. Cut and wash the nice leaves, tie with a cord and hang up to dry. When dry put them in a paper bag and save for seasoning soups or dressings.

ORANGE AND DATE SALAD.

One pound dates, four good sized oranges. Peel the oranges, one head lettuce. Separate the dates, cover with boiling water and cook for two or three minutes. Drain and dry in the oven. Cool, stone and cut in pieces lengthwise. Peel the oranges and cut out the sections of pulp, leaving the membrane. Wash and crisp the lettuce, arrange on a platter, pile the oranges in the center and surround with the dates. Add the French dressing and serve.

CURRY CAKES.

Rip some cooked potato through a sieve place it heaped up on a tin in the oven to brown; when quite crisp on all the surface remove it to the chopping board and dust with curry powder, the right quantity being one tablespoonful for every half pound. Chop up half a sharp apple and one small onion. Butter some little upright tins and after mixing the potato and other ingredients with one beaten egg, fill the tins up with this, spread butter over and bake for 15 minutes. Turn out and decorate if desired, with dice cut out of hard-boiled eggs.

SEQUEL TO BROKER DAVIE'S OPERATIONS

Boston, Dec. 21.—A further sequel to the financial operations of Robert C. Davie, the young State street broker, who disappeared some weeks ago leaving behind a trail of unpaid bills and a score of anxious investors is furnished in the U. S. district court, where an involuntary petition in bankruptcy has been filed against him.

The action is taken at the instance of three creditors with aggregate claims of \$3873; They are the London Harness company; Francis J. Keiler, this city, \$3200 on a note, and the Collins & Fairbanks company, hatters.

The petitioners declare that Davie committed an act of bankruptcy in that on Dec. 12 he permitted while insolvent, Henry J. Harriman of Newton to obtain by foreclosure a preference over the broker's other creditors and that on Oct. 21 and Oct. 31 he transferred to other creditors some money, as well as his piano and automobile.

The petitioners further assert that other property was similarly transferred with intent to defraud creditors.
