Washington, Dec. 14.—Figures compiled by the Chief of Army Chaplains, show that about 18,000 religious services were held during the last year in the army with an attendance of 1,284,884.

This was an average attendance of about 100 at each service. Each officer and soldier in the army averaged going to church twelve times during the year. The chaplains officiated at 1,401 marriage ceremonies during the year.
