

WHILE A HAVEN NO PORT OF CALL

IMPORTANT DECISION IN A DIVORCE SUIT

Mr. Justice Clement on Necessity of Enforcing Permanent Residence.

Vancouver, Aug. 2.—"This province may be a haven of refuge, it should not be a port of call," states Mr. Justice Clement, in the course of a long judgment dismissing the petition in the divorce suit of Adams vs. Adams, on the ground that he was not properly domiciled in the province. His lordship strikes a warning that people may come specially to reside in this province because British Columbia alone of the provinces west of New Brunswick was competent to grant divorce, and in that event there should be the clearest evidence that the provision requiring permanent residence in the province is a clerk in the city, who has lived here since last autumn. He had resided with his wife in Alberta, and parted from her there after eight years residence in that province. He had, however, previously resided in British Columbia, coming here from the east. The judge refers to the point that the petitioner would not swear that it was his fixed intention to remain in the province.

After referring to judgments in the English courts, his lordship says: "I don't lose sight of the argument, which may be very properly advanced, that as between the various provinces of Canada (if we accept Quebec), the marked likeness in our laws, the court may well be more ready to draw the inference of intent to settle in one province upon removal from another than in the removal from Scotland to England, with their different laws and legal system. But on the other hand the court cannot shut its eyes to the fact that in this province alone of all the provinces west of New Brunswick can a wronged spouse find a court competent to dissolve marriage and the incentive to come to the province is strong. I don't wish, however, to be understood as holding that because a man's motive in coming to this province may be to procure the dissolution of an intolerable marriage tie that the court must necessarily find a want of fixed intention to make this his permanent home, his community. The motive may be sufficient to induce a man to come to live permanently in a community, where he may get release from his bonds, but it must be apparent to any one who gives the matter a moment's consideration that the court in a case like this should insist on the clearest of a settled intention to abide here permanently. This intention may be a haven of refuge; it should not be a port of call."

CHINAMAN MURDERED. Proprietor of Restaurant Stabbed by Guest Who Tried to Steal Forks and Spoons.

Hallebury, Ont., Aug. 2.—One Chinaman was murdered by an Italian in the King Edward restaurant on Main street, and another badly stabbed in the hand. A well-dressed Italian, about 30 years of age, entered the restaurant, the proprietor of which is a Chinaman. After he had finished eating he commenced to pocket some of the forks and spoons on the table, and not content with that, began to stow away the saltcellars. An altercation followed. The Italian refused to give up what he had taken and the proprietor of the restaurant came down to help his fellow countryman. The Italian thereupon drew a stiletto which he had concealed in the bosom of his shirt and stabbed the young Chinaman under the left arm. The blow went straight to the heart and the Chinaman dropped dead. The murderer escaped to the door, but half-way down Main street he dropped the dagger and Police Constable Collins threw him to the ground, and he was taken to jail.

FLYING TO COLOGNE.

Unfavorable Winds Retard Progress of Airship Zeppelin II. NO WATER FOR BEER.

Schmidt declares that the action is taken on account of the poor water supply of the city. He declared that if a new system is put in, the one projected to a mountain stream, he will take \$100,000 worth of bonds.

TWO NEGROES SHOT.

Villa Platt, La., Aug. 2.—Ed. Jackson and Will Miller, negroes, accused of robbery and with intimidating white women, were taken into the woods by a mob today and shot to death. Twelve men were chosen from the mob to act as a jury and they were given a brief sort of a trial. When pronounced guilty, they were summarily executed.

CHARGED WITH STEALING MAIL

POSTAL EMPLOYEE HELD ON SERIOUS COMPLAINT

Jumps Through Open Window When Accused, But is Caught.

(From Monday's Daily.) Investigation conducted by Postmaster Noah Shakespeare into complaints that letters mailed here had been mislaid, led Saturday evening to the arrest of Frederick Babbage, an employee of the post office department. A charge has been laid against him of stealing from his Majesty's mails.

The case was called before Acting Magistrate Prior in the police court this morning when the accused did not appear. He was represented by J. A. Aikman, who said he understood accused had injured his ankle shortly before the arrest. He asked to be put in court on that account. He asked for a remand until Wednesday, which the city prosecutor agreed to, and the acting magistrate fixed bail at \$7,500, accused in \$2,500 with permission to apply for variation of the latter amounts and the number of sureties, provided full sum was not deviated from. Babbage has been employed gathering mail from the city boxes and at other times acted as sorter in the office. On Saturday evening he was so engaged when E. F. Sheppard, a fellow employee, was attracted to the movements of Babbage, which were out of the usual. Mr. Sheppard's suspicions were aroused, and he gave more than passing attention to what was transpiring. He believed Babbage was handling letters which he had no business to be touching at that time. So close a scrutiny did he keep on his man that before the latter was ready to leave he was able to charge him with theft and seized him. Calling on J. H. Lowry the accused employee was securely held by Mr. Lowry while Mr. Sheppard rang up by telephone Postmaster Shakespeare.

Babbage was taken into the postmaster's room and watch kept on him. He complained of feeling faint, and while his guardsmen were getting him water and removing him to another room he took advantage of a window being opened to make his escape. He dropped from the window, a distance of nearly 15 feet to the pavement below, and made a dash for a passing car. Mr. Lowry had dashed out the other way, however, and was unable to mount the steps of the car and pursued him. The husky form of Mr. Cesse (alias), per lb. 20¢ 25¢ Mr. Lowry placing his arm about Babbage at once induced the latter to accompany him. The police were enlisted, and Babbage taken to the police station.

Before leaving the post office several letters were thrown away. An incident in their fight inconvenienced Tacoma. The Northern Pacific officials have made a ruling that freight coming in Milwaukee cars for delivery to commercial houses and mills located on Northern Pacific sidings must be transferred from the Milwaukee car into a Northern Pacific car before the latter line will touch it. This has resulted in practically excluding the Milwaukee road, so far as merchants on Northern Pacific spurs using it, are concerned. Practically all the shipping industries in and about Tacoma are on Northern Pacific sidings. Milwaukee officials declare such procedure is childish; Northern Pacific officials declare it is business.

The little god of love smiles while Mrs. Victoria Love lovingly tells Franklin Love that she is sorry she was unloving enough to sue for divorce. Two months ago Mrs. Love fled a sensational suit in which she alleged that Love had attempted to poison her so he could get possession of her property. In addition she had him arrested for the same reason. Saturday they decided that two loves had dwelt apart long enough and so Victoria Love and Franklin Love lovingly went before the court and asked that the suit be dismissed.

SEATTLE PIONEER DEAD.

Seattle, Wash., Aug. 2.—Mrs. Chas. Prosch is dead at her home on Ninth avenue, following a prolonged illness. Mrs. Prosch and her husband came to the coast in 1875 and they took an active part in the affairs of pioneer Seattle. Both were known to practically every old resident of the northwest. Mrs. Prosch, who was born at Monroe, Orange county, New York, was 85 years of age.

BATHING FATALITY.

Melita, Man., Aug. 2.—Thomas Hayes, aged 22, a clerk in the Union bank here, was drowned while bathing in the Souris river. He and some friends went down to the river after supper, and while in the water together, Hayes got beyond his depth and sank. Hayes was a native of Ireland and had no relatives in this country. ADOPTS REPORT ON TARIFF BILL. Lively Debate on Proposed Changes. Republicans Denounced for Failing to Keep Party Pledges.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 2.—By a vote of 195 to 183 the House on Saturday adopted the conference report on the tariff bill. The day opened with what appeared to be part of an organized filibuster against the conference report, when Mr. Mondell, Wyoming, demanded the reading of the lengthy document. This proceeded for about an hour and a half, when, with about two-thirds remaining to be read, Mr. Mondell permitted the debate to go on. Chairman Payne defended the report and appealed to his Republican colleagues to support it, prophesying at the same time that when the bill was enacted into law it would meet with the approval of the country. Mr. Clark, the minority leader, and many of his colleagues denounced the bill, and chastised the Republicans for failing, as they alleged, to revise the tariff downward and thus keep their party pledges.

PEOPLE OF GEORGIA MUST DRINK WATER. State Legislature, in Need of Cash, Impose Heavy Taxes on Soft Drinks. Atlanta, Ga., Aug. 2.—If the Georgia legislature incorporates into the general tax bill all the provisions introduced by members it soon will be nearly as hard to get a drink of sodawater in the state as it is now to get a drink of whiskey. Face to face with a deficit and with salaries and bills unpaid, the soft drink industry has become the biggest revenue producer in the state. Here are some tax clauses already passed by the House: Five dollars a year upon each faucet of a sodawater fountain; \$500 a year for each manufacturer of carbonate water; 25¢ a year upon each bottling machine in the state; a revenue stamp costing 5 cents for each gallon of syrup or tincture of extract manufactured or sold.

WANT JEFFRIES-JOHNSON FIGHT. Visalia, Cal., Aug. 2.—The directors of the Tulare Agricultural Association have passed a resolution offering \$50,000 for a Jeffries-Johnson fight here provided the event is pulled off at Tulare on September 16th, during the annual fair. Behind the resolution stands fifty wealthy men, whose financial ratings are anywhere from \$10,000 to \$100,000.
