Victoria Meteorological Office, 24th to 30th August, 1904. The weather during this week remained when the barometer fell along th in advance of a rain area from the Pacific, which, during Sunday, spread in normally heavy rainfall for this season of the year, and particularly on the Lower Mainland, where it exceeded one inch in 24 hours. This heavy precipitation has exfinguished the majority of the bush fire on Vancouver Island and the Mainland and cleared the air of smoke. The winds have been light to moderate on the Stra'ts and sume more time than is usually along the Coast, and fogs have occurred on
