MRS. C. M. BOSTWICK

Very Suddenly at Her Home

Yesterday Afternoon.

A very sudden death of Mrs. C. M. Bostwick, Carmarthen street, yesterday afternoon, came as a great shock to relatives and friends. The death had been in her usual health within a few hours of her death. She had been in attendance during the afternoon, but nothing serious was expected. In fact, the rest of the day was spent in the usual way, alone being with Mrs. Bostwick. A few minutes before 5 o'clock a sudden attack of heart trouble developed. Inches was summoned, but in ten minutes all was over. Mrs. Bostwick had suffered from la grippe in the spring, having had a very severe case, and had not fully recovered from the attack. She was the daughter of Samuel Small of Amherst, N. S., and had married thirty-eight years. Mrs. Bostwick was 69 years of age at the time of her death. She was a widow, and was the mother of two sons, both of whom are now living. C. M. Bostwick, Jr., of this city, and Guy Bostwick.

Johnston, treasurer, Huntley McDonald, Bedouque, P. E. I.; committee, F. Taylor, P. Conroy, J. Warburton, MacNeil, Dr. Devine, and G. E. Davitt. It was decided that the society appeal to the legislature of the maritime provinces for legislation relating to prevention of blindness in strabismic cases. The next meeting will be in Charlottetown.

DEMOCRATIC PLATFORM.

ST. LOUIS, July 7.—The democratic national convention today adopted the report of the committee on rules, credentials and permanent organization.

The session opened at 10 o'clock, an hour later took a recess until 2 p. m. and adjourned at 6:20 until 10 o'clock tomorrow. The sub-committee of the committee on resolutions spent the entire day until 5 o'clock in perfecting the details of the democratic platform, concluding at that hour with the adoption of a gold standard plank. The plank was voted on during the absence of Mr. Bryan and Congressman Williams, and the ballot stood 7 to 5, the affirmative votes being cast by Messrs. Daniel, Hill, Patterson, Hamlin, Cable, Poe and Davis, and the negative votes by Messrs. Dubois, Shively and Newlands. The understanding was that if Messrs. Bryan and Williams had been present they would have cast their votes in the negative, thus bringing the opposition vote to five. The platform was presented to the full committee at 8 o'clock tonight and the contest over the gold plank which had occurred in the sub-committee was soon renewed and with cumulative force.

NEED LARGER QUARTERS.

The Maritime Steam Lithographing Co., which for over a quarter of a century has occupied its present premises on Dock street, has decided to move to larger quarters and has secured the fine brick building on the corner of St. James and Westworth streets, formerly occupied by the St. John Railway Co. as a power house for its system. This change has been found necessary owing to the continued increase in the business, which has outgrown the present quarters.

MONTREAL, July 7.—Sheldon T. Bent, managing director of the Shawinigan Carbide Co., was arrested today on a charge of having embezzled four thousand dollars of the company's money. TORONTO, July 7.—A gathering of representative citizens at a meeting yesterday decided to tender Lord Dundonald a reception prior to his departure from Canada. J. P. Ellis, president of the board of trade, is presidential chairman. A public dinner will be given on Friday to consider details. It is intended that the affair shall be non-political but thoroughly representative of citizens of Toronto, non-military as well as military.
