WHITE BEAR WINS AGAIN.

Seawanka Cup Races Now Stand Two Each.

MONTREAL, Aug. 9.—White Bear, the American challenger, won today's race on Lake St. Louis, and the fate of the Seawanka cup rests on the fifth race tomorrow. Each yacht has now won two races.

Today's race was one of the prettiest ever sailed for the cup. After a fine struggle from start to finish the Yankee crossed the finish line one minute and two seconds ahead of the defender.

It was White Bear weather, and the challenger made the most of it, showing herself to be a wizard in moderate to light winds and smooth water. There was not a ripple to interfere with her scow-like nose.

UNDERWRITERS SATISFIED.

On Monday afternoon the board of fire underwriters sent to the board of public safety the communication desired before the contract for the new chemical engines was signed.

This letter stated that the two engines recommended by George Blake and under consideration of the board would be in every way satisfactory to the underwriters, and that whenever they are placed in commission in St. John fifteen cents per hundred dollars will be taken off the present fire insurance rates. Being in commission means that the engines must be properly equipped with hoses and masts, one stationed in the north end and one in the city, and ready for use at a moment's notice, as are all other pieces of fire equipment.

HAD MANY PASSENGERS.

The Calvin Austin arrived shortly before seven o'clock yesterday evening. Her cargo consisted of both cargo and freight was well tested on this voyage, for when she left Boston she had a passenger list of one hundred. Three hundred and five of these came on to St. John, the rest setting off at Portland. As regards cargo she had a varied assortment both for St. John and Portland, and her hold was nearly full.

Of the passengers who came to St. John by far the greater number were tourists, most of whom passed through, although nearly a hundred must have patronized the city hotels.

DELAY IN I. C. R. SERVICE.

A large number of patrons of the I. C. R. between Montreal and this city are complaining that No. 123, due in this city at 1.10 p. m., each day is being held a long time at Montreal for connections north. On Monday the train was one hour and three-quarters late, and on Friday one hour and forty minutes. There is no other train before noon beyond Hampton, and men of business are greatly inconvenienced.

Three trains run from Montreal to St. John during each afternoon, one following the other, and No. 123 should be allowed to proceed on schedule time, and let the late northern passengers come in on one of the other trains.
