Between seven and eight last night the police were called into the house of James Stewart, Elliott Row, to quell a disturbance which his son Fred was making.

It was announced from the chair at the meeting of the Father Mathew Association last night, that a glee club will be organized for the coming winter and a paid instructor obtained.

The ladies of the Silver Falls Methodist church are to hold a garden party on the persons grounds tomorrow afternoon and evening. Buckboard leaves head of King street at 2, 4 and 6.15.

The St. Croix, due last night, did not arrive until this morning at 9.30. The cause of the late arrival was delay in leaving her wharf at Lubec, due to the thick weather and the heavy fog which she encountered.

George Schmiedel, a cab driver, was arrested at Vienna for some minor offense recently, and sentenced to a short term in jail. George is built on decidedly generous lines, and it was found that the sentence could not be carried out, as he was so large that there was no cell big enough to hold him.

Willard L. Broad, conductor of the I. C. R., is seriously ill at his home, 157 Rockland street. Mr. Broad has been confined to his home for a couple of weeks and his many friends feel quite anxious as to his condition, but his physician and relatives are hopeful of a change for the better in the course of a few days.

The drills are again going at Cheverle oil fields, and the new well is down over one hundred feet. The present well which was located under the direction of Prof. Woodman, of Dalhousie Mining School, is on the crest of a well defined anticline. The plant is in good working order and the drilling is progressing satisfactorily.

VICTORY FOR EDDIE HANLON

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Sept. 6.—Eddie Hanlon, of San Francisco, defeated Willie Fitzgerald, of Philadelphia, last night on a foul in the seventh round. When the foul was committed Hanlon apparently had Fitzgerald beaten. In the seventh and last round Fitzgerald struck very low and "Spider" Kelly, Hanlon's second, promptly claimed a foul which the referee allowed. He then declared Hanlon the winner.

CIRCUIT COURT.

Clarke vs Green on Today—Criminal Case Tomorrow—Connolly Case Against City Was Postponed.

The first case which came up in circuit court yesterday afternoon was that of Connolly vs. the City. At the request of Mr. Skinner, who claimed that two important witnesses were out of the province, the case was postponed and made a remanet to come up at next session.

The grand jury found a true bill in the case of the King vs. Moore. Solicitor-General Jones asked that the case be set for Thursday morning, to which Mr. Mullin, the prisoner's counsel, consented. The accused were released on \$1,000 bail.

This morning the case of A. A. Clark vs. Louis Greene came up and the plaintiff was examined. The case, which is an old one, deals with the collection of rents. The defendant made a seizure of goods belonging to the plaintiff for rent and Mr. Clark now brings an action for damages, claiming that much over the value of the rent was taken. Bustin & Porter and A. A. Wilson for the plaintiff, and Dr. Macrae and C. N. Skinner, K. C., for the defendant.

ALLEGED BOY THIEVES AGAIN IN COURT.

The case against the three boys for stealing brass from the I. C. R. round house was continued this morning before the magistrate. The boys were remanded until Friday morning at ten o'clock.

Ernest Northrup, whom the witnesses yesterday connected with the prisoners in the alleged theft, was on the stand this morning. He gave his age as sixteen and said that he worked in the cotton mills and had done so for the last three years. On Sunday morning he was with Matthew McNutt and James Allen. Later he met the three prisoners, and they told him that they had some brass between the workshop and another little building near it. He told him with them he took up the brass and hid it in the sawdust, and carried the piece, which James Allen told him he could have.

Questioned by Detective Killen he said he recognized the brass brush. This Jim Allen had taken out of a car in his presence and given to him. The boys were remanded until Friday morning at ten o'clock. The boys are being kept separate from the other prisoners.

Four drunks were fined \$3, three were let off with half that amount, while another was remanded.
