MISS GEARY ALIVE, SAYS LAWYER.

Mistaken Identification of Suit Case Victim. Nathan's Counsel Hopes to Find Murdered Girl and Prove His Client's Innocence.

PITTSBURG, Nov. 1.—Attorney Henry Siskand, who accompanied Nathan to Boston, while waiting for his train at Union Station last night, started the newspaper men by saying that he expected to produce Miss Geary alive.

The departure of Nathan for Boston was not accomplished without a struggle despite Nathan's desire to return. Inspector McGarr, of Boston, accompanied by detectives Geo. Cole and James Egan, of the local force...
