WASHINGTON, D.C., Jan. 28.—The tariff officers of the government today recommended to the president, through the secretary of state, that proclamations be issued by him declaring the following named countries as not being unduly discriminative in their tariffs against the United Stattes and therefore entitled to receive minimum rates of duty imposed by the Payne-Aldrich act.




