MILWAUKEE MAKES WASTE PAPER KEEP A BIG ESTABLISHMENT RUNNING

City Finds there is "Conservation of Resources" in the Gathering of Every Bit of Material Capable of Being Converted into Pulp—Girls are Expert Graders.

Milwaukee, Wis., June 20.—What becomes of the waste paper in Milwaukee? The import of the question is soon recognized when one recalls how rapidly the little scraps gather, even in a private home, and considers the greater quantities that accumulate in all large business places.

The disposal of waste paper, says the Evening Wisconsin, is an industry of importance in this city. Waste paper is a commodity in the class of raw materials, and it is estimated that 25,000 tons are handled here annually, representing more than \$200,000 worth of business.

Many years will pass before the last word in conservation of resources will have become common knowledge, but it is fully as many years back in the past when waste paper was a human activity. When the first waste paper gatherer began making his rounds? That man's mental industry spelled conservation in one of its most important forms.

Important Centre for Business.

If that early day conservationist was of economic value, he would know how much greater should be the value of the one who follows his example today, when raw material for paper is becoming scarce. The knowledge is evident, and shrewd business men have realized the situation for many years to their own profit and to the benefit of human kind. The handling of waste rags and paper is a big business, and it probably will surprise many Milwaukee residents to learn that their own city is one of the most important in the world in redeeming waste paper for further use.

The waste rag business is important in many cities, but the handling of waste paper has received attention in only a few cities as an industry of any magnitude, and Milwaukee is a pioneer in that particular.

In many cities of the United States, newspaper plants, publishing houses, department stores, manufacturing establishments which have waste paper constantly accumulating are accustomed to go to expense to get rid of the stuff. Large newspaper and publishing plants, even that handling millions of newspapers, get the nuisance of their hands. No so in Milwaukee, Chicago and St. Louis. These three cities have large business establishments, devoted almost exclusively to the handling of waste paper, and so substantial is the business that the institution is the business waste instead of receiving pay for removing it.

Small Trade to Dealers.

A large waste paper plant, for example that of the William B. Franzen Company, in this city, employs fifty persons and nine teams. Ten times throughout the year, at gathering, cleaning, sorting and baling waste paper from paper pulp factories in Michigan, Indiana and Illinois, principally. There is little making of waste paper from paper pulp in Wisconsin, though the State leads in the world in pulp branch of the paper industry.

In the city the teams made their trips daily to the newspaper and publishing plants and big business houses and to other institutions to gather the waste paper. The company wagons do not visit private homes or the smaller institutions.

These smaller accumulations go through two hands before reaching the paper company's plant. The private residence and small business place must depend on the common paper and rag gatherer, who in turn sells to what are known as "dealers," of which there are about a dozen in this city. The "dealer" usually handles the waste paper in the form of bales, being only one of his "lines." When he has a wagon load of waste paper on hand he notifies the company and relieved, receiving the same prices as the other business houses.

Waste paper in bales and bags is shipped to the city from all parts of the State and adjoining States, even grocers and small business men in small towns having learned that the "dealer" became an element in spoiled wrapping paper and anything else with paper fibre in it is sensible and profitable conservation.

The average company pays all the way from one cent to \$1 a hundred pounds, according to grade, for this waste paper. At the plant it is first sorted for foreign substances, then thrown into an immense hopper leading to a machine called the "duster." The mass leaves this big mysterious mechanism quite as indescribable as it entered, but with one change—it is clean. From the "duster" the paper is carried by a system of rollers and evidences of previous use, travels along a sorting table, carried by a broad conveyor. Ranged along this table are girls each trained to watch for paper of certain description and who gathers all such paper as the conveyor reaches the terminal it is not carrying anything of value and it is thrown into a bin.
