ST. JOHN INTERESTED
IN THIS DIFFICULTY

Industry that was Expected
to Come to Courtenay
Bay, in Trouble—F. F.
White, Receiver.

The financial difficulties of the
Canadian Iron Corporation will prob-
ably put the quietus on plans that
were in progress to have the iron
industry at Courtenay Bay, N. S., moved
to St. John and located at Courtenay
Bay. According to reports now ap-
pearing in Upper Canadian papers,
the Canadian Iron Corporation had
mines at Esplanville, Ont. (Essex
Ont. S. Furnaces at Midland, Ont., Rad-
nor Forges, Quebec, and Drummond-
ville, Que. and smelters at Fort Wil-
liam, Hamilton, St. Thomas, Midland,
Montreal, Three Rivers and London-
derry, N. S.).
Since the application for liquidation
of F. F. White, of New York, has been
made receiver.

The corporation has outstanding the
following securities:
First mortgage bonds, \$2,920,000
Consolidated bonds, 1,717,933
Preferred stock, 2,000,000
Common stock, 4,332,300
The last annual statement, under
date of May 31st, 1912, showed a net
revenue of \$773,140, which was suf-
ficient to meet fixed charges and have
a balance of \$4,556, that year bring-
ing the total amount at credit on that
date up to \$408,373.

The Globe of last evening says: The
hope is expressed that with recon-
struction all creditors will be paid in
full, although some time will prob-
ably elapse before this is possible.
Perhaps in reorganizing it will be re-
quired that St. John is a more favor-
able place than Londonderry for the
industry now located there.

LETTERS CONCERNING
THE VOTING TODAY

LEAVE WELL ENOUGH ALONE.
To the Editor of The Standard:
Sir—The question of the proposed
two-storey building law is one of vital
importance to all wage-earners in the
city and surrounding districts. For
the very reason that behind this
movement, judging from the argu-
ments advanced are those who seem
to be deeply interested in the
division property, now selling at prices
much beyond the average wage-ear-
ner's income. It would be in the in-
terests of all concerned to leave the
present building laws as they are and
maintain the established fire district
as under the old law. My reasons are
three in number:—
First—Let us fill up our city by
building on our vacant lots and a
three-storey building would add
more dignity to our city than the
squatty two-storey wooden building
under the new law.

Second—In re insurance our pre-
sent fire law calls for a three-foot
space between each building, thus
rendering the three-storey wooden
building a safer risk in the event of
fire than a three-storey brick building,
as the brick building would collapse
in such a case, and is more dangerous
to life and limb. Witness the awful
results of the 1877 fire, one previously
on Prince William street, when seven
or eight persons lost their lives.
Third—Take for instance Alexandra
street, one of our best and newest
streets, with its pretty and useful
self-contained wooden houses, in the
case of fire they could not be re-built
under the new law, nor could people
owning any wooden building three
stories high re-build under the pre-
sent law, as they would be forced to
build a two-storey wooden house.

WORLD NEWS
CONDENSED

Labor Unrest in London
Cause of Much Trouble—
Imperial Defence Confer-
ence in Canada.

Labor Unrest in London.
London, Aug. 25.—The recurrence of
labor unrest in many forms is evi-
denced by the fact that half a dozen
strikes are now in progress in Lon-
don. Thousands of men are already
affected, and there are threats of still
further troubles. In almost every case
the demand is for increased wages,
although the question of trade union
recognition figures prominently in
some disputes.

Paris, Aug. 25.—Following a mili-
tary parade, after the troops had
marched back to the Belleville bar-
racks, anarchists and syndicalists to-
day paraded the Belleville industrial
district, smashing shop fronts, firing
revolvers at the street lamps, and at-
tempting to derail the trams. Enter-
ing a cafe, they bombarded a group
of patriotic demonstrators with
glasses, siphons and chairs.

Paris, Aug. 25.—Paris has gone color
mad, and the general effects of the
fashion opening may be summed up in
a single phrase. The great makers
of women's costumes are rejoicing at
