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SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, may make a quarter-section of available Dominion and unpatented lands in the Northwest Territories, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Department of the Interior, Ottawa, or at the District Office, or by proxy may be made at any Dominion Land Office (but not at a sub-office), on certain conditions:
Duties—Six months residence upon cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within one mile of the land, or on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A reasonable house is required where residence is performed in the vicinity.
In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section of available land. Price \$100 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$200.
The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$300 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$200.
The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
