Kingston, Jamaica, May 9—The Canadian Pacific steamship Montesum as sailed for Montreal today with 6,600 tons of sugar, the largest cargo of sugar ever shipped from this island. To date Canada has purchased over 75 per cent. of the recent sugar crop of Jamaica.

JURY UNABLE TO PLACE HESPONSIBILITY

Infant, Found in Sand Pit, Murdered by Some Person or Persons Unknown.

Marysville, May 9—An inquest, resulting from the discovery of the dead in body of a male infant in a sand pit near the eastern part of the town, April 22, was held here tonight before Coroner D. W. Ross of Fredericton. There was a large attendance and much interest in the case. Nine witnesses were heard, and the jury, after fifteen minutes deliberation brought in a verdict to the effect that the child had come to its death at the hands of some person or persons unknown to the jury, death being due to a fractured skull, also that an offense had been committed in the concealment of birth.
