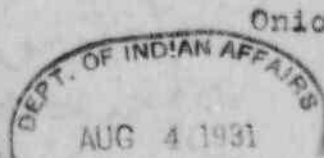

Sir,

I have the honour to refer to your letter of May 29th last, No. 115-8-5, with reference to Mr. Inspector Murison's on the R. C. Indian Residential School here, and, in reply to the first paragraph thereof, to state that I am still in correspondence with the Fairbanks-Morse Company with respect to one of their engines at this school which is unworkable. I have furnished the Company with all the information it requires and believe that this trouble will be made right almost immediately.

With respect to the condition of the plaster at this school. Most of the damage has been done on the two stairways, east and west, from the basement to the second floor. There are also a few patches required in the classrooms and other parts of the building. The whole of this work can be done for, approximately, \$25.00.

In connection with this work I would say that both the Reverend Principal and the Sister Superior urged me to ask the Department to have burlap placed throughout these halls and stairways, and, if the Department can see its way to do so I would certainly recommend having burlap put on. The quantity required would be about 200 yards, which at 50¢ per yard would amount to \$100.00 and, together with an allowance of \$60.00 for the necessary moulding and labour would cost a total of, approximately, \$160.00.
