### Grow More Farm Products is Cry

WOULD CREATE COMPETITION TO BRING DOWN PRICES OF NECESSITIES

HALIFAX, N.S., June 4.—Increase the production of the necessities of life so that competition in the market will ensue and with it a drop in the prices of commodities was the cry for the high cost of living outlined to the industrial relations commission at its session here to-day by J.E. McClurg, manager of the Halifax shipyard.

He said that the Government could help by encouraging manufacturers to get production at a maximum rate. He claimed that they got more from the worker five years ago than to-day while he should give a better day's work for a better day's pay.

F.H. Bligh, ex-minister of Halifax, said the Government laid too much stress on the building of an export trade. It should first see that its households were fed.

A warning that if the labor unions instead of taking as their slogan, "increased wages," took "the reduction in the cost of living," it would secure the support of a large body of middle-class people.

### Mr. Crerar May Resign Portfolio

WOULD CAUSE SOME EMBARRASSMENT TO THE GOVERNMENT

OTTAWA, June 4.—The story is revived in Parliamentary circles to-night that, now that the budget has been decided on and is of a character that he dissents from, Hon. T.A. Crerar will quit the Cabinet if he should it will cause some embarrassment. His views are well known and likewise his intention of ultimately going back to the United Grain Company.

The particular embarrassment would be that of the Western members who would be put in a rather delicate position if Mr. Crerar, their leader, so to speak, should retire on a tariff issue and they should not follow suit. They fear they may hear from home. If this thing happens the budget debate may see some additions to the cross benches and a more enlivened spectacle than of late has been witnessed.

Mr. Crerar was barely in the House to-day. Evidently he is in deep thought and is unconvinced.

The two names most prominently mentioned as possible successors to Mr. Crerar if he retires are Dr. Tormie, of Victoria, B.C., who is one of Canada's outstanding live stock experts, and Dr. Rutherford of Calgary, now a member of the railway commission and a former Liberal member.
