

Toronto-Sarnia Highway Is Urged Upon Legislature

PROVINCIAL MINISTRY WILL NOT CURTAIL PROGRAM BECAUSE OF ANY MONEYS RECEIVED FROM THE DOMINION GOVERNMENT.
TORONTO, March 27.—Municipal representatives from cities, towns, villages and counties along the direct route from Toronto to Sarnia, together with a number from other centers, invaded the Parliament buildings to-day

to impress upon the Government the necessity for a provincial highway between Toronto and Sarnia via Brantford, Georgetown, Aetion, Guelph, Kitchener, Stratford, St. Marys and Parkhill and through the fruit belt near Arkona and Theedford.
The deputation, which was one of the largest ever seen here, included representatives from Sarnia, Parkhill, Theedford, Forest, Mitchell, Seaforth, Clinton, Goderich, Stratford, New Hamburg, Kitchener, St. Marys, Guelph, Baden, Georgetown, Brantford, Aetion, Listowel, Palmerston, Hanover and the counties of Lambton, Huron, Perth, Wellington, Waterloo, Halton, Peel, Grey, Bruce, North Oxford and North Middlesex.
Start Of Proposal.
Some months ago, when the project of a provincial highway from Toronto westward to the international border was mooted, the representatives of a northern route made a strong bid for the highway. The Government, however, after giving careful consideration to the matter, decided on the more southerly route through Hamilton, Brantford, Woodstock and London. Now the advocates of the northerly route are urging the Government to proceed with both routes.



The preparatory work for yesterday's demonstration was done last month, when a resolution, adopted at a meeting of municipal representatives, held in Stratford, was passed on and approved by the various municipalities. The resolution, which was submitted to the prime minister, called upon the Government to commence the work immediately, and to proceed with survey work with a view to the later construction of a feeder system which would accommodate the territory north of the proposed highway and east of Lake Huron.
The need for the highway was voiced by about a dozen speakers, who were introduced by Wellington Hay, M.P.P. for North Perth. Those who spoke were S. W. Wilson, crown attorney, of Sarnia; Mayor Stevenson, of Stratford, Hon. Nelson Monteith, former minister of agriculture; W. D. Euler, M.P., of Kitchener; T. J. Hannigan, of Guelph; Major Grant, reeve of Georgetown; Mayor Bull, of Brantford; Mayor Moore, of Aetion; Deputy Reeve Clarke, of Goderich; Reeve Bohlander, of Waterloo; Reeve Jennings, of Theedford; Mayor Nesbitt, of Sarnia, and Reeve Beavers, of Exeter. The addresses were all brief, the speakers chiefly emphasizing the fact that the people of the district to be served are practically unanimous in demanding the highway.
Premier Sympathetic.
The prime minister, in replying, stated that he accepted the presence of such a large deputation as evidence that the Government in the general policy of aggressive road construction has the whole-hearted support of the people of the province.
"Your representations will receive our best thought and consideration," he promised. "I am not in a position to give you an answer to-day. You will readily understand that. An undertaking of the magnitude of the one you suggest cannot be lightly entered upon."
In agreeing with the statement that the people are demanding roads, the prime minister pointed out that not in one or two years could the scheme of road construction that the Government had in mind be worked out, but in view of the present circumstances the Government proposed to go on with construction as actively as possible in order to provide employment and create faith and confidence in the people.
In referring to the federal grant the prime minister said that the Government was waiting to see the promise given effect in legislation.
"I can assure you," he said, "that there will be no curtailment on the part of the province in its expenditure by


