

Queen Scout Is Honored In Parade, Flag Decoration

DIXIE — A church parade and flag decoration service in memory of Queen Scout David Warren, son of Mr. and Mrs. Nelson Warren, Cooksville was held Feb. 19 at St. John the Baptist Anglican Church.

David lost his life in a plane crash September, 1966.

The St. John 2nd Dixie Rover Crew presented the official Anglican flag to the church and it will stand in the sanctuary alongside the retired Canadian en-

sign and the Union Jack, which was saved from the fire which destroyed the original St. John's in 1924.

The official scout flag was given for the use of the Scout troop in memory of David by his parents. The official Rover flag was given by David's brothers Bob and Denise for the use of the Rover Crew.

The flags will stand in the church hall where the boys hold their regular meeting. The service was conducted

by Rev. Jeffrey Billingsley, rector of St. John's and chaplain to the boys.

David had entered the St. John's Cub Pack at the age of eight, earned his First and Second Star and became a 'Sixer' before entering the Scouts at 12.

Making excellent progress, he earned the badges of Plumbers, Telegraphers, Pilots, Firemen, Ambulance man, Dispatch rider and three Conservation badges. He earned the bronze and silver Arrowheads for patrol leadership and was a troop leader and assistant Scout Master.

Along with Laurie Jarvis, Dave was the first one to earn the Queen Scout Badge in the St. John's Troop.

In August of 1965, he and three others flew to the Seventh Rover Wee Moot in Glasgow, Kentucky.

Cooksville Doctor Jailed Three Months

COOKSVILLE — Dr. Leslie J. Gondor, 55, of Cooksville, was sentenced to three months in jail by Judge W. F. B. Rogers for trying to abort a 19-year-old Barrie girl a year ago in his Edward st. office in Toronto Feb. 20.

Dr. Gondor, who received \$400 for the operation, pleaded guilty. The girl became ill Feb. 26 and was admitted to Barrie hospital.

Arthur Maloney, defense counsel, said the doctor graduated from the University of Prague and had worked in Austria and England before coming to this province.

Mr. Maloney also stated that the father of three had been injured in an automobile accident which claimed the life of his wife and father.

Lovers Of Nature Battle To Save Rattray Marsh

CLARKSON — Nature lovers are fighting hard to save the Rattray Marsh from the hands of developers. Up to date 1,339 have signed a petition urging township council to do its utmost to preserve the area as a wild life sanctuary.

The petition, bearing 927 signatures, was sent to Reeve R. W. Speck on Feb.

5th, 1967. So far it has not been acknowledged.

The committee, which currently instituted the movement to save the marsh, is forming an organization to be known as the Rattray Estate Foundation to further their objective. Letters have been sent out to wild life and nature organizations throughout Ontario, inviting them to support the movement by delegating members to the foundation.

A further meeting, sponsored by the committee, is to be held at the home of C. Shorney, 72 Clunberland Ave., on March 3rd. The proposed plan by Ontario Humane to establish a nature school at the site will also be considered.
