

Q. How were you dressed when you surrendered yourself?

Q. Did you complete the well?

A. No, sir.

Q. To what depth did you go?

A. About nineteen feet, sir.

Q. That is about a foot a day.

A. That is about all I could do, sir.

Q. Was your home quarantined while you were absent?

A. No, sir.

Q. When you 'phoned your Company Commander at Currie Barracks, didn't you tell him that your home was quarantined?

A. No, sir.
