REASON FOR THEIR INVASION OF UNITED STATES TERRITORY.

tiquity of the Monorable Artillery Con pany-Noted for Feats of Gastronomy-Sanquet Tendered the Visitors by Tools Besten Prototypes Cost No Less Than 860,000 Sketch of the Two Companies

A recent notable event in the annals of the Ancient and Honorah's Artillery Company of Boston water the visit of the Honorable Artillery Company of London, the world's oldest military organization, which came in response to an invitation extended by the Massachusetts company when it crossed the ocean in 1896 and was the guest of the famous London military body.

The Honorable Artillery Company of London was chartered by Henry VIII. in 1537, more than a century before any existing British regiment

was organized, under the title of the Fraternity Guild of St. George, and at first consisted of archers. At a very early period in its existence it adopted the use of artillery and be-came virtually a school of instruc-tion for the officers of the city— "trained hands—which purpose it ful-filled for two centuries


During the last hundred years, however, the company has been not-ed for its peaceful proclivities and has won more fame for its prowess with the knile, fork and bottle than on the strenuous field of battle. Their recent visit to Boston closed with a hanguer which cost \$60.000 and they banquet which cost \$60,000, and they kept up their reputation as gourmands.

The present lieutenant-colonel and actual commander is the Earl of Denbigh, who lead the invasion of the United States by the doughty trenchermen of the Honorable Artillery Company.

The Earl of Denbigh, who has been the company's commander since 1893, was a real soldier for years and served both in India and Egypt. He distinguished himself at Telel-Kebir and was decorated for bravery there. He was one of Queen Victoria's Lords-in-Waiting and now fills that office for King Edward. the London fighters, is the oldest military body in the United States. It was organized in 1637 under the title of the Military Company of Massachusetts, and a charter was granted by Governor Winthrop on March 13, 1638. The original charter is still in existence.

The Boston organization has a right to its claim of lineal descent from its London, prototype, for Captain Robert Keayne, who probably suggested its formation and was its first commander, was in the old country a member of the Honorable Artillery Company, as were several of his associates. INDIAN SECRET SOCIETY.

Strange Ceanibal Rites Attend the Initia-tion of New Members of the Society Ma-matsa in British Columbia.

Among certain Indians of British Columbia cannibal rites attend the initiation of new members into the influential society Ha-matsa, which rules the affairs of the tribe. The novice is first required to live alone in the woods for three or four months, where he is supposed to be in communication with the cannibal spirit which rules the society. Finally the others begin to lure him back to the village. Songs are sung by all the people as they walk to and fro in the village and up and down the beach. down the beach.

During this interval the candidate

During this interval the candidate has appeared several times at various points. One of the assembly, half clad, is then sent ahead to act as a decoy or bait for the novice. As soon as the Ha-matsa sees him he rushes up and bites mouthfuls of flesh from his arm. He is then surrounded by the assembly and marched toward the dancing house, the people singing on their way. At this point a female dancer appears and begins to sing Ha-matsa songs, during which she moves toward the dancing house, stepping backward and facing the novice whom she desires to coax inside. Her hands and arms are extended as though she were carrying a body for the candidate to eat, The palms of both hands are turned upward in front of him, and he keeps watching the him, and he keeps watching the hands of the dancer. All the assem-bly enter the house of the cannibal society.

After lingering an hour or so the

novice goes to the rear, climbs up to the roof and descends into a sec-

ret reom. Shortly afterward he dashed out among the people and seizes the nearest man and bites his arm. He circles around the fire holding on to his victim with his

teeth.

This performance is repeated four times, the novice selecting a different man on each occasion. He is thought to be out of his senses. In the first dance of the candidate he represents one looking for human flesh. His movements are executed in a squatting position, making wild and violent gestures as he proceeds. He wear a crown of red cedar bark and is he z by a large ring around his neck so that he will not attack and bite more of the people. The female dancer again appears in front of him, dancing as before described. The candidate then returns to his secret quarters, and the people take off their cedar ornaments and throw them into the fire. This is called smoking the wildness out of the new

smoking the wildness out of the new Ha-matsa.

For two nights the dances are kept up, after which the novice shows signs that he has become nearly pacified. The last night of the ceremony ends in a general festival, at which all the men, women and children of the tribe are invited. The candidate now appears dressed for the first time in a button blanket and a new headdress and neck ring. He then pays the men for the bites he has inflicted during initiation, the price being a canoe for each bite.

An Ice Poultice.
In many cases of inflammation an ice poultice is a very useful application. It is made in this way: Spread a layer of linseed meal three-quarters of an inch thick on a piece of cloth and upon the meal, put at intervals lumps of ice about the size of a marble. Sprinkle meal over the ice and cover all with the cloth, turning the edges over. In this way the ice will last much longer than it otherwise would and the poultice will be quite comfortable.
