Reports of the official tests of 40 cows and heifers were received and accepted from July 16th to August 3d. Among the mature cows Angie Mercedes again comes to the front with 29.59 lbs. of butter, while Lady Pieterie comes a close second with 25.59 lbs. She is the first cow tested by her owners and he should certainly be encouraged by her record.

Angie Mercedes is again recorded for junior four-year-olds is again broken by Netherlands Belg with 33.17 lbs. of butter in six days and 153.43 lbs. in 30 days.

This young cow ran very evenly through her test and her record was confirmed by a series of Wadman's Chazars, that lately held the record for junior yearlings with 29.59 lbs. of butter and record of 109.35 lbs. in 30 days.

In the junior three-year-old class, Evergreen March 2nd, 12609, again comes to the front with 24.73 lbs. of butter in 7 days and 35.86 lbs. in 30 days, making the second in the class for her age.

The Director of Experimental Farms has been notified of the ownership of such a heifer.
