James, Duke of York, often whiled away the ime witnessing the iufliction of the boot and thumbsorew, and what a savage the people of the ,resent day regard him. I remember reading a story once of a host who placed a guest near a roasting fire and insisted upon his remaining there. No doubt the intention was good, but the victim failed to see it. How far manners go to making a man is worth considering.

If there still exists a doubt in the mind of any one as to the glorious possibilities of agriculture in this Province, I would advise such a person to visit the office of Messrs. Winnett \& Cooper, the Trounce Avenue real estate men. These gentleman have gathered together a large collection of the products of British Columbia soil, so that when any old eastern farmer drops in and tells them that British Dolumbia can never become an agricultural country, thiey simply refute his statement by directing attention to their grand display.
