SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST LAND REGULATIONS. THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency. Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homestead may live within the miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$500 per acre. Duties—Six months' residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 60 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$300 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 20 acres and erect a house worth \$200. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. W. W. WHAT IS THE WEIGHT OF YOUR BRAIN?

You are never likely to know, but from the facts which will be cited in this article you may make a good guess. There is a popular notion that a big brain means a big intellect. It is an entire delusion. Any scientist will tell you that the power of a brain is in proportion to the number and complexity of its convolutions and folds and has nothing whatever to do with its bulk. If it were otherwise, if the size of the brain were a sure indication of intellect, certain animals would be more intellectual than men. The smaller animals have always proportionately larger brains. Thus a cat has more brain in proportion to its size than a sheep, and a baby's brain is ten times the relative size of its father's. This has been held to be a sufficiently crushing reply to the cynical males who profess to see woman's inferiority in her ounces less than a man's. It is scientifically true that a woman's brain weighs less than a man's. The writer has often seen brains put to the test of the scales, and his notes clearly indicate that the average for the male brain is forty-nine ounces, for the female brain forty four ounces. But this is a curious point. If the average weight of a man is one hundred and fifty pounds and that of a woman one hundred and twenty-six pounds, it is found that the weight of the brain relative to the body weight is rather more in the female than in the male. Woman herself if appealed to would very likely find other lines of defence. Thus she might argue that and rightly—that all mental activity finds its origin in the thin outer layer or cortex of the brain. On every square inch there are some odd millions of cells, and the amount of mental energy. Might not a more just comparison be based on a consideration of these cells? But no observer has yet shown that there is any difference in the number, development, or vital energy of these brain elements. Size of body or size of head has nothing to do with the weight of the brain any more than weight of brain has necessarily to do with intellect. Even Shakespeare may have had a brain weighing less than that of the average body-builder of the present day, and Pope, who was a little man, may have had a brain outweighing by some ounces that of the stalwart and athletic Christopher North. United States and Carranza In Agreement

By Special Wire to the Courier. Washington, March 14.—Administration officials to-day momentarily awaited word from General Funston that the first detachment of American troops were moving into Mexico in pursuit of Villa and his bandits. Latest official information from the border indicates that mobilization of troops had made such progress that the first force was ready to cross the international boundary line at any time. Officials are confident that the situation so far as General Carranza himself is concerned has been adjusted by the acceptance of his proposal for a reciprocal arrangement by which eight of his troops or American troops may pursue either side of the border. A note of acceptance was on its way to-day to Carranza. Under this arrangement General Funston will order the mobilization of troops in order to dispose of the preparedness bills and it is believed that an agreement to that end may be reached between the two houses. The president is particularly anxious for action on the preparedness measures.
