Canada's Food Board Requests of the Housewives of Canada

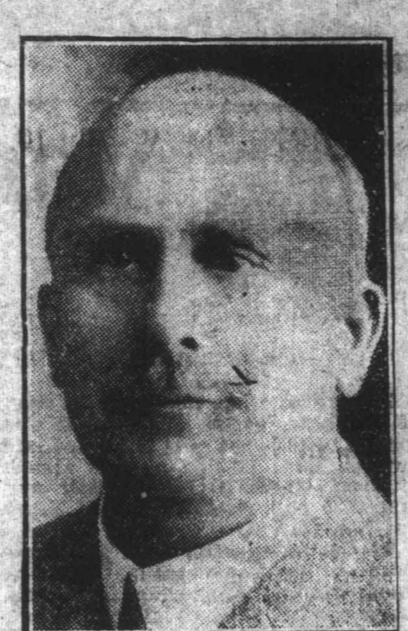
"Cheap fish or fish cheap!" sounds the same, doesn't it? But there is a difference. In substituting fish for meat, Canadian housewives have become very discriminating.

The Canada Food Board, in the early days of food conservation, made the pardonable mistake of advocating "cheap" fish as a substitute for beef and pork.

The Food Board officials know they are not pardonably unaware of the prejudices of the public mind.

There was a time—not so very long ago—when Pacific halibut could hardly be sold at ten cents per pound.

These are the varieties of fish in which the Food Board are interested, and which they urge the greater use of as a meat substitute.

can be procured at the same and lower prices. In the large cities of the Eastern Provinces, Atlantic haddock, cod, pollock, hake, cusk, flounders and skate can be purchased from ten to fifteen cents per pound.

All these are instances of excellent fish which can be procured at cheap prices, yet such is the perversity of human nature that if any of these particular varieties were sold in scarcity and priced at 25 or 30 cents per pound, the dealer would have less trouble in selling them.

The fishermen and the fish trade are doing their part. It is up to the housewife to do hers and use more of it—accepting in mind when she purchases that not buying "cheap" fish, but fish "cheap."

Discipline Fine Aboard "Vienna" Canadian Troops Bore Up Well When Ship Went Aground

A Canadian Atlantic Port, July 7.—Lieut. Col. Edouard LeProhon, of Montreal, officer commanding the troops who were on board the Hallinger, City of Vienna, when that steamer was ashore near here, states to day that many of his men lost their kits, great coats and in some cases all they had, in their hasty disembarkation from the stranded ship.

On account of the heavy sea running the disembarkation of the men was a tedious and dangerous job, but no man was injured.

Captain John Perrington, master of the City of Vienna, in a letter to Lieut. Col. LeProhon, says: "I have not the least doubt that it was almost entirely due to your excellent discipline that we were able to disembark all the men without loss of life or injury."

Among the C. E. F. who were on the ship were: Captain George Foster, Guilford; Major H. W. Sims, London; and Lieut. R. C. McAndrew, Niagara, Palestine.

VON KUEHLHANN RESIGNS POST IN KAISER'S CABINET

Dispatches From Berlin Announce Decision of German Foreign Secretary A JUNKER VICTORY

Paris, July 9.—The German Emperor has accepted the resignation of Dr. Richard Von Kuehlmann, the German foreign secretary, according to a Basel dispatch to the Havas Agency.

It is expected that Admiral Von Hitzo, the German minister at Christiania, and formerly minister to Mexico, will succeed him.

Dr. Von Kuehlmann became foreign minister on August 6, 1917, succeeding Dr. Zimmermann, whose retirement closely followed the exposure of his plot to involve the United States in a war with Mexico and Japan.

His Mistake. Dr. Von Kuehlmann's conduct of the foreign office appeared to be more than usually successful until June 25 last, when he appeared before the Reichstag to discuss the political aspects of the situation facing Germany.

In view of the magnitude of this war and the number of powers, including those from overseas, that are engaged, his end can hardly be expected through purely military decisions alone and without recourse to diplomatic negotiations.

This statement, which fairly contradicted speeches by the German Emperor, who at a short time before had referred to peace won by "The strong German sword," was received with consternation in the Reichstag and with sharp criticism by the country.

It was later reported that Dr. Von Kuehlmann's words had been approved by Gen. Ludendorff, the German commander on the western front. This brought to a head the story of friction between Ludendorff and the German crown prince and his coteries, who comprise the Radical pan-German elements in official circles.

Some reports were to the effect that his address was intended to inform the German people that their armies could not win the war, and was delivered with the cognizance of the emperor, who, when he saw what a storm had been stirred up, resorted to the high bluff of the scapgoat.

His retirement is a victory for the junker party.
