Strong Efforts Will Be Made to Terminate the Boer War.

MRS. BOTHA WILL BE PRESENT.

Boer Agents to Come From Europe and America.

BOTHA ADVISES KRUGER.

Queen Wilhelmina Visited Berlin to Secure Assistance of Emperor in Ending Hostilities.

London, June 10, via Skagway, June 15.—Mrs. Botha leaves tomorrow for the Hague where Kruger has been summoned to attend a conference having for its aim the termination of hostilities in South Africa. Boer agents will be present both from America and Europe and they will consider a report from Gen. Botha, who advises Kruger to sue for peace.

Wilhelmina Assisting.  
London, June 10, via Skagway, June 15.—Queen Wilhelmina's late visit to Berlin was intended to obtain the assistance of the emperor to bring about an end of the Boer war through The Hague arbitration court. It is reported in The Hague newspapers that the emperor consented. The matter has created a great sensation in Berlin. Count Von Seulow states that neither France, England or Russia has ever approached Germany with a view toward ending the Boer war. He says that Kruger came to Europe to secure the good offices of the powers, but that Great Britain does not want the good offices of any power. Germany has all along distinguished between good offices and intervention.

### THE LATEST NEWS FROM THE WAR.

A Succinct Review of the Situation as It Now Stands.

The Spanish Fleet Dredging. But Certain of Evasive Capture Dewey in Control of Manila. The Navies Compared.

At the beginning of the war between America and Spain no one doubted the final result, but the overwhelming defeat being administered to the Spanish navy was both surprising and unexpected. Modern history fails to recite an incident where a nation has been so inhumanly treated as has been Cuba by Spain. American interests were at stake, and America was nearest neighbor to the oppressed nation. Barbarities and starvation increased, and finally at the earnest solicitation of the liberty loving people McKinley sent his memorable message of three P's to Spain: "Feed, Freedom or Fight." Spain relented the first, and war became inevitable, but America believed that a resort to arms in the interest of humanity and civilization was eternally right and would command the admiration and respect of the entire world.

Americans became impatient, and even upon the floor of congress McKinley was accused of being too slow in commencing hostilities. But he better than they, knew our situation. He did not strike until the iron was hot, and then simultaneously all over our nation the navy and land forces were moving. Close upon this came Dewey's great victory over the Spanish fleet, when they thought they were lying in perfect security before the guns of their own forts at Manila. But one strong hold was left the Spaniards, that of Havana, and here the Spanish Cape Verde fleet hurried. But it was too late; Schley was there and had joined Sampson and anxiously awaited its coming. In the meantime the great warship Oregon had arrived and joined the fleet, and with the acknowledged best gunners in the world was ready to do her duty. Our latest information was that the Spanish fleet was dodging about the island, seemingly only trying to avert a battle with American ships.

Knowing that the Philippine islands were lost to her, Spain as a return courtesy to France, gave them to her. Proud of the gift, France sent at once her fleet, stronger than Dewey's across to take possession of them. The French admiral sent word, to the very commander to go out, and he replied if he did it would be through the bottom. But this was not the only surprise in store for the French. England had heard of this anticipated move, and promptly sent over a powerful fleet with instructions to see that no foreign flag be raised on the islands until the war between America and Spain was settled. All honor to old England for the stand she took.

No one blames France for wanting the islands, as they would prove a rich prize. They contain a population of 8,000,000. There are thirty-one islands in this group, and their area exceeds that of Great Britain. Pine and fir trees are abundant, and large areas are suitable for wheat raising. The principal exports are sugar, rice, tobacco, coffee and cocoons, and amount annually to about \$10,000,000. Their loss to Spain will be the greatest since Mexico left her grasp.

Thus it is all over the world—envied eyes are turned toward Uncle Sam as they see slipping into his grasp these valuable lands, Porto Rico, and if he desires it, Cuba. They will make no effort to prevent it, however, for directly in their path lies that Anglo-Saxon bulldog who but four weeks since notified the world to stand back and let the Yankee and the lion settle their own dispute.

Beyond the above, nothing definite has as yet been received concerning the war. The situation has remained about the same for the past two weeks. The Nugget will keep in touch with all sources through which outside information can be obtained, and its readers

will be furnished with the news promptly and accurately.

Latest Official War News.

On the steamer Bellington, from Spanish ports Charles Eschwege and son Michael, M. I. T., have been engaged for three years as engineers on the Klondike River. They have granted him the privilege of building a telephone line from Vancouver via Dawson City. The mother has been granted a permit to mine gold in the Klondike, and the work will be pushed to completion next year. Mr. Eschwege also bridges the river, reports of the war, and the condition of the Klondike. Eschwege was in touch with the U. S. Consul, and he is in actual conflict. If not already in actual conflict, France's continued encroachment upon West Africa will give her an ultimatum of seven days to withdraw her troops from West African soil. This she refused to do, and so the seven days have passed, and the general opinion was that between those countries would begin at once. The alliance between England and America is so strong that the two nations will support each other in any conflict. The stars and stripes and union jack Sampson has yet been unable to call the Spanish fleet to account. The Spanish fleet is like a frightened rabbit. Should a general war occur it is probable that Japan, with the third strongest fleet in the world will assist America.
