## BIG DEAL WAS PENDING

### Coal Mines at Town of Frank Were About to be Sold for \$2,000,000—Negotiations Brought to a Standstill by Recent Disaster—Volcanic Theory Is Ridiculed.

Ottawa, May 1.—A two million dollar deal for the purchase of the Frank coal mines was about to be consummated when the recent disaster occurred. Frank to report upon the catastrophe, has wired Ottawa to the effect that the disturbance was caused by an immense rock slide. Geologist Wm. Pearce, who represents the Dominion government, after a close examination pronounces it to be a mountain slide and ridicules the idea of volcanic or any other character of eruption.

## EASTERN CAPITAL

### Looking Information Regarding the Yukon

### Interested in Operations Now Being Conducted by Fitzhugh the Expert.

In a letter received from the last night by Leroy Tozier from E. F. Bradford, general manager of the Yukon Company, dated at New York, April 28, the writer states that he was preparing to make his usual pilgrimage to the Klondike in a very few days. Though brief the letter contained several matters that will be of particular interest to the people of Dawson. One is concerning the Klondike Mines Railway. Mr. Bradford says that he had met Mr. Huxley and Mr. Henny in New York only the week before and they assured him and he is morally sure the road will be built to the Forks this season. He also says that he has received the assurance from the most authentic sources that a portion of the Valdez road will also be constructed. During the winter the writer confessed to having done all in his power toward dispelling the local ignorance prevalent in that section concerning the Yukon and Alaska, and he still has several letters yet to deliver before leaving for the north. At the time of his writing, Buel the cartoonist had just arrived in New York on his first visit to the metropolis and had called on Mr. Bradford. The latter had made an engagement to introduce him to a number of mysteries in the city also several models that the young artist desired to study from an artistic standpoint only. ## MORE STAKING

### Nugget Gulch and a Tributary Stampeded.

Another old creek has been revived and given a new lease on life, Nugget gulch, a tributary of Eldorado entering at 28 on the left limit, having been the scene of a stampede yesterday afternoon, the first staker to record arriving at the gold commissioner's office this morning. The gulch is one of the old timers having been staked originally in '97 since which time with the exception of one or two claims at the mouth all have been allowed to lapse. The man who arrived this morning to record was Richard Bailey who staked the upper half of No. 4 on a tributary entering at No. 19 on the gulch, sometimes called Ten pup and by others erroneously the left fork. He stated that he had found twenty cent dity and that all the claims above and below had been taken and would be recorded very soon. He had prospected his ground some time before making the find. As soon as he had done so he informed some of his friends and advised them to stake just below him which they did. Quite a number were also relocated on the main creek. The main gulch in '97 was staked up to 21 and Ten pup to 16. Bailey did not state the depth of the ground but the assumption is that it is pretty deep.

## TRESPASS CHARGED

### Klondike City People Refuse to Pay Toll

### Collectively They Cross the Bridge and Ignore the Man Placed There by Owners.

### The question as to whether or not the Klondike river bridge connecting South Dawson therein and at the Klondike city can be used as public property is to be investigated by the courts, summons having been served today on a score or more of residents of Klondike city, citing them to appear in the police court on Monday next when they will be called upon to answer the charge of trespass. The charge is preferred by those in charge of the bridge.

### The toll house was reoccupied by a collector on Monday of this week and his appearance therein and at the ticket window thereof was to the Klondike city people as a red sweater to a Spanish bull or the song "Star Spangled Banner" to a Georgia colonel who "waked 80 miles and 230 niggahs, one to plow and two to hoe, sah, lo de wah." On Wednesday afternoon it is alleged that dozens of Klondike city to the number of twenty held a council of war and decided to cross the bridge in a body which they did, walking four abreast. They did not pause or even hesitate at the toll house, the keeper of which did not essay to interfere with the onward march of the intrepid twenty. In the evening, the party re-crossed without the formality of paying toll, hence the cause of action being taken in the court.

### An effort will be made to have the government purchase the bridge for public use, but as it is now almost going out with the ice and the eye of the going out of the ice and as the bridge narrowly escaped going out with the ice last year, prospective purchasers will doubtless be disposed to hide a wee and until the danger period is past, although from the precaution which the bridge owners have taken to protect the piers no serious trouble is apprehended.
