cord. Leave feet on, but have them
thoroughly cleaned, but do not scald
them.

Kill poultry Saturday before, keep
in a cool dry place but don't let freeze.

Do not contract your poultry before
coming to market.

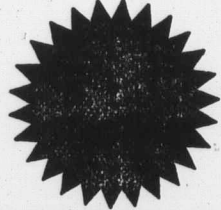
Gored by a Bull
