SYNOD OF HURON A Book Favors the Total Prohibition of

and the Passage of More Effective Temperance Legislation-Congratulations to the Queen

London, June 21 .- At yesterday's ses ion of the Synod Canon Richardson in troduced a resolution for the drafting of a congratulatory message t be sent to the Queen on her 62nd anniversary of her accession to the throne This was greeted with prolonged cheers, and a moment later a large flag was brought in, and this was the signal for all the delegates rising to their feet and singing "God Save the Queen." The report of the committees on the Observance of the Lord's Day and on Temperance were received. The former deplored the growing profanation in various ways of the Sabbath and mentioned the Lambeth Conference's deliverances on this sub-

The report of the committee on temperance was presented by the Rev. W. J. Taylor. The committee recommended:—(1) That the synod invite the co-operation of other temperance organizations, with a view to securing legislation in regard (a) to the total abolition of dringing saloons, (b) the amending of the license law so as to make the supplying of drink to a drunken man an indictible offence, (c) the making of habitual drunkenness an offence punishable by law; (2) that the habit of treating, which leads to foster drunkenness, should be discouraged both by precept and example by every member of the church; (3) that the regulations of the present license law. The report of the committee lations of the present license law should be sustained by a more efficient discharge of police duties, backed up by public opinion. The report stated that the committee had restated that the committee had requested his Lordship the Bishop to send a message, wishing god-speed to the deliberations of the World's Temperance Congress, assembled in London, England; and finally the committee called attention to the statement made by Field Marshal Roberts respecting our forces in South Africa, fiz.:—"That it is the most temperate army that the nation ever sent forth army that the nation ever sent forth to maintain her cause." The report was adopted.

A GREAT MAN GONE

Russia's Foreign Minis'er Expires Suddenly-Europe's Leading State man.

St. Petersburg, Thursday, June 21. The Russian minister of foreign affairs, Count Muravieff, died suddenly this morning. Muravieff had just finished his morning cup of coffee and had ordered his lunch when he fell in an apoplectic fit and expired in a few minutes. His death at this critical effect on the course of Europe, as he was considered the strongest statesman of the day. It was Muravieff's interference that so suddenly checked Turkey in the late war with Greece.
