PEACE!

At five o'clock yesterday afternoon the glad good news reached the Maple City, via C. P. R. telegraph, that Peace had been declared between the Briton and the Boer.

The text of the despatch received by The Planet was as follows:

London, June 1, 1902.—An official cablegram from Lord Kitchener dated from Pretoria 11 p. m. last (Saturday) evening states that a document containing terms of surrender was signed there at 10.30 p. m. by all the Boer representatives, as well as by Lord Milner and Kitchener.

Through the courtesy of the telegraph company copies of this despatch were forwarded to all the city clergymen with the result that the good tidings was proclaimed from the various pulpits last evening, almost invariably followed by the hearty singing the doxology.

Although the news has been anticipated for the past few days, its receipt occasioned united and soulful rejoicing. In Chatham, whence sturdy sons have fought and bled and died on the South African veldt, the end of the war will be observed by a grand gathering of thanksgiving on Tecumseh Park.

And the whole Empire is uniting in the great rejoicing.

POSSIBLE DISQUALIFICATIONS.

Says the Hamilton Herald, independent.

In view of the Boer Government's very small majority, the possibility that three Liberal members elect will be disqualified becomes a matter of considerable importance. These three members—Hon. Mr. Stratton, Mr. Pattullo and Mr. Graham—have proprietary interests in newspaper offices in which election ballots were printed. It is claimed that this fact disqualifies them from sitting as members of the new legislature. Here are the two clauses of the Revised Statutes, chap. 12, which, it is said, cover the case of the three members:

9. No person, whosever, holding or enjoying, undertaking or executing, directly or indirectly, alone or with any other, by himself or by the intervention of a trustee, or third party, any contract or agreement with his majesty, or with any public officer or department, with respect to the public service of Ontario, or under which any public money is to be paid for any service or work, matter or thing, shall be eligible as a member of the Legislative Assembly, nor shall he sit or vote in the name.

15. If any person hereby disqualified, or declared ineligible, or incapable of being elected a member of the legislative assembly is nevertheless elected and returned as a member in an election and return shall be null and void.

Whether the three members are the sole proprietors of the printing offices or whether they are merely shareholders in joint stock companies which have offices may have much to do with the result of their disqualification.

THE STRIKE AS A POLITICAL WEAPON.

The Swedish strike has been completely successful. Stockholm has resumed its wanted aspect of watery beauty and peace, and universal suffrage is assured. But this is it seems to us only the minor part of a great achievement. The Swedes have really done a great deal more than alter the list of voters of their native land; they have discovered a new political weapon of tremendous and incalculable force. This is not the least true because they do not seem fully to have recognized it themselves. It happened thus: Following the example of Belgium, which still sighs in vain for what the Swedes have won, the brave men of Stockholm decided to do no more work until they had gained a redress of grievances. So the big factories which are dotted among the islands of Northern Venice, were deserted. Still parliament would not give in. Then the carrying companies stopped work, but without success. After a space of waiting the street cars decided that they, too, had political aspirations, and ceased to run. It was in vain. Finally, all unexpected, came the decisive blow; the printers went out—including the men who in times of peace, printed the parliamentary debates. Then the legislature came to order. If one's speeches were not to be printed, what was the use of speaking against universal suffrage? what was the use of being a legislator? what was the use of anything? So they faced the prospect with despair, and then suddenly gave in. Sweden has universal suffrage and a new and tremendous instrument of popular right has emerged into the light of the modern world.

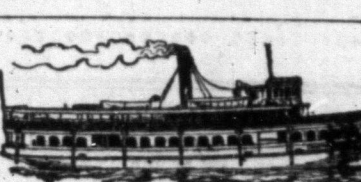
