## CORPSE CAME TO LIFE AGAIN.

Narrow Escape of a New York School Teacher From Being Buried Alive.

New York, Jan. 12.—Miss Louise Schaefer, teacher in public school No. 25, this city, became ill a week ago, and her illness taking a serious turn, she became unconscious. A physician was summoned, and after examining her carefully, he declared her services were useless as she was already dead. Friends of the family gathered to condole with them, and arrangements were begun for the funeral. When the undertaker arrived preparations for the funeral were begun, and but for a timely discovery by one of the mourners that Miss Schaefer's body moved, and a subsequent examination which convinced the physician that the young lady was in a trance, she would have been buried alive. Powerful remedies were applied, and the spark of life began to return, the blood to circulate and a slight flush overspread the pale features. Through the day Miss Schaefer gained slowly and every effort was made to hasten returning consciousness. She is still weak and confined to her bed, but will ultimately recover.

## KITCHENER IS ONLY HOLDING THE RAILROADS.

He is Getting Thirty Thousand Mounted Men Ready to Chase Boers to the Bitter End.

London, Jan. 12.—It is understood that Lord Kitchener now holds securely all the railroads in South Africa, having recovered possession of the Delagoa Bay line, which has been cut Jan. 7.

According to the Pretoria correspondent of the Daily Mail, Lord Kitchener is now organizing a force of 30,000 irregular horse which will occupy some weeks. When this force is ready he will resume offensive operations. Meanwhile the invasion of Cape Colony looks more threatening. The news that Commandant Hertzog has two guns is rather startling, as it was formerly asserted that the invaders had no guns. The defenses of Cape Town, including two 4.7 naval guns, are now completed, and the recruiting of volunteers is active throughout the colony.

## AFTER FIVE WEARY DAYS OF SUSPENSE AND DANGER.

The Crew and Passengers on the French Mail Steamer Russie were Saved—A Thrilling Time.

Barman, Bouches du Rhone, Jan. 12.—After a night of terrible suspense, all of the passengers and crew of the French steamer Russie, from Oran, Algeria, which stranded near here during a violent storm, Monday, have been safely landed. As the life-line connected from the shore with the steamer parted again yesterday afternoon, when night set in no communication with the stranded steamer was possible. The last signalled message read as follows: "We have not a scrap of food left. Consternation prevails on board." On receipt of this appeal the fishermen made two more plucky launches of their boat, but were beaten back, and as the Russie disappeared in the darkness, those on board were apparently trying to launch their only remaining boat.

The storm raged with renewed fury during the night, and only those who were compelled to do so stayed on the shore, part of them having been rescued from the gale in the Barman lighthouse. At midnight two floats with lines attached to them were launched, but both attempts to reach the Russie were fruitless.

IN THE EARLY HOURS of the morning torches were lighted at the bow of the Russie, and in response to the signal to reach the wreck. But they were again tossed ashore and the crew of the lifeboat, who belong to the fishing village of Carro, gathered around a bonfire

made of wreckage from the steamer, drenched to the skin and with teeth chattering from cold, but not discouraged. Their heroism finally was rewarded, as, with daybreak, the weather perceptibly moderated, the sea became calmer and the wind, having shifted from east to north, the Carro fishermen at about 6:30 a. m. again put to sea. The spectators watched with fast beating hearts as the boat disappeared through the waves. More than once it was thought she was engulfed, but the small craft rose in sight again on the crests of the waves and approached gradually nearer the Russie. Then a rope was thrown, which the fishermen caught, and the lifeboat soon afterwards was alongside. Then, above the howling wind, rose cries of joy from those on board the Russie, which were echoed by the crowd ashore. Another boat, manned by four men, was then launched and succeeded in reaching the

WRECKED VESSEL. A few minutes later the Carro boat left the Russie's side, heavily laden. As she approached the shore the occupants were seen to be women and one baby. The enthusiasm was delicious. The spectators plunged into the sea. Some of them dragged the lifeboat ashore and others lifted the women. Their arms, through the waves, to dry land. One woman was clasped in the arms of her son, who had been waiting on shore since Monday. She made another effort to reach the wreck. But they were again tossed ashore and the crew of the lifeboat, who belong to the fishing village of Carro, gathered around a bonfire

collapsed from fatigue, cold and hunger. Their haggard faces and trembling limbs told of the awful experience they had gone through. It was unfortunate that want of foresight resulted in all the nourishment being kept at the lighthouse, two miles distant, for the sufferers had to walk there, assisted by their friends, before restoratives could be administered to them. The four-oared boat next arrived with seven more passengers, and the lifeboat then made repeated journeys, until all were saved and sheltered in the lighthouse.
