Mr. and Mrs. Edward Kelly, of Euphemia, Celebrate Fiftieth Anniversary of Their Marriage

The golden wedding anniversary of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Kelly, of the Township of Euphemia, Lambton County, was celebrated at their home last Saturday, March 9. All of the children whose vocations permitted were present. Altogether there were over one hundred relatives and friends gathered to do honor to the very respected couple.

The spacious drawing room was beautifully decorated in gold and white, and the tables fairly groaned under the weight of good things placed upon them. The room was lined with one hundred wax candles, the wedding cake being also decorated with smaller tapers, and trimmed with gold, the whole making a very pretty sight to behold.

The supper over, the tables were removed, and the second part of the program was commenced, the most interesting feature of which was the presentation of an address and a purse of gold to the aged couple. The presentation was made by ten of the grandchildren, who marched in one by one bearing the purse of gold and each carrying a gold ribbon. There were many gold pieces in the purse as Mr. and Mrs. Kelly had spent years of married life. The address, which was read by Mr. James Pritchard, was as follows:

To Mr. and Mrs. Edward Kelly, Euphemia Township, County of Lambton:

Dear Sir and Madam,—Whereas we, a few of your friends, having learned that you are about to pass the fiftieth anniversary of your marriage, desire to express to each of you our very sincere and hearty congratulations for having been spared to celebrate this, the golden wedding day, and ask your kind acceptance of this purse of gold as a slight token of our high esteem and regard with the assurance of our very best wishes for your future happiness and welfare.

Signed on behalf of those above mentioned; this the ninth day of March; one thousand, nine hundred and seven.

The balance of the program consisted of concert selections, over which Mr. George Kelly presided. Mrs. McGuigan, whose age is 76, was present and told some droll stories regarding Mr. and Mrs. Kelly's courtship. She was the only one present who attended their wedding fifty years ago. The concert was under the directorship of Mr. Ed. Pritchard, and was well put on.

Among those present from a distance were Mr. and Mrs. Dennis Kelly, of Kingston. Mr. Dennis Kelly took a photograph of the entire assemblage before the gathering broke up. Relatives and friends were present from Chatham, and all over the County.

HENRY ALLENOR DEAD

Henry Allenor, one of the oldest residents of this city, passed away Tuesday afternoon, at the ripe old age of 77 years, 3 months and 19 days. Deceased has been ill for the last five years and has been an invalid during that time. He has been a resident of this city for the past 50 years, and was one of the city's most respected men. He was born in Market Arden, Norfolk, England, and came to America in '40. He settled in the United States until '43, when he came to Chatham, and took up his residence on Harvey street, where he lived during his whole life in Chatham. His residence was one of the first brick houses erected in Chatham. He was an old volunteer fireman, and in the early days carried the mails from London to Windsor, before the old Great Western Railway was put through. Latterly he was a Maple City drayman. The immediate cause of death was heart failure.

Deceased never married, and the only surviving relatives are two sisters, Mrs. Springer and Mrs. Littlejohn, both of this city.

The funeral will take place this afternoon at 2:30 to the Maple Leaf Cemetery.

CAPT. FOSTER DIES

A well known figure in marine circles, passed away at Port Powell, Ont., the other day, in the person of Captain Foster, who at one time was the owner of pleasure steamers which ran to Springbank from London.

He is survived by three sons and two daughters—Mr. Charles Foster, Flint, and Mr. D. Foster, Marine City; Dr. Arthur of Flint; Mrs. Cooper, Milford, Ont., and Mrs. Titus, of Detroit.

Deceased at one time sailed pleasure boats on the Thames and also at Erieau. He was well known in Chatham and vicinity.
