## BURIED UNDER BLANKET OF SNOW

Heavy Fall in Colorado and Wyoming—Cold Weather in Florida

CHICAGO, Oct. 25.—Snow over-spreads the states on the eastern slope and in the foothill region of the Rocky Mountains; rain, snow and colder weather are reported from various sections of the north-west and lowered temperatures are forecast to penetrate to the lower

Ohio Valley and Tennessee by tomorrow. A six inch blanket of snow closed for the winter the few mountain passes in Colorado which remained open before the storm and snow drifts in southern and central Wyoming and in parts of Colorado blocked automobile traffic.

The heaviest fall of snow is reported from Fox Park, Wyoming, where two feet covers the ground, and drifts of from four to six feet are common. The snow line gradually diminishes eastward, with North and South Dakota reporting slight falls and Western Minnesota flurries.

Points on the northern Great Lakes last night issue storm warnings and snow is expected to follow the heavy winds which drove shipping to cover. The region of the gale is expected to be confined to the northern lake area, however.

Colorado reports heavy damage to unprotected crops, especially the beet sugar crop, and telegraph and telephone lines in many localities suffered. Transcontinental trains also were delayed. Thousands of sugar beet field workers around Greeley, Colo., are out of work as the result of the storm.

In the south and southwest drops in the mercury caused considerable shivering. Texas and New Mexico were promised rain and snow for today, as the Colorado storm presses eastward. Miami, Fla., haven of northern residents seeking refuge from icy blasts, yesterday reported the lowest temperature in 28 years. Thermometers registered 52 degrees.

Heavy snows at Colorado Springs yesterday marooned three men on the summit of Pike's Peak. A relief train rescued them after they had been forced to spend several hours on the mountain top.

## APPLES FOR THE EMPIRE SHOW

240 Packages of the Valley's Finest Have Been Forwarded to London

BERWICK, October, 26.—An event of considerable significance to valley fruit growers is the British Empire Fruit Show, to be held in London early in the New Year. The fruit branch of the Dominion Department of Agriculture is sending a specially prepared exhibit of apples from the Annapolis Valley, consisting of 200 boxes or compartment cases, in which each apple is carefully wrapped in oil paper, and 50 cases commercially packed. The fruit, which was specially selected from such standard varieties as Kings, Spy, Golden Russet, Wagner and Gano, was prepared last week in the new warehouse of the Berwick Fruit Company, under the supervision of Chief Fruit Inspector G. H. Vroom, assisted

by Inspector George H. Hutchinson. The shipment was forwarded on Saturday via St. John. On reaching London it will be kept in cold storage until required for show purposes.

Last year Berwick fruit carried off a number of prizes of the Imperial Fruit Show, and the fruit sent this year is of the quality to repeat last year's performance. Apart from any prizes which may be won, the exhibit at the British Fruit Show of high-class fruit is good advertising for the Annapolis Valley, and, indeed, for the whole Province, and should have some influence in turning the thought of intending settlers of a desirable type in this direction.
