Ex-Premier to Visit Canada

LONDON, May 1.—The Canadian Press learns that the Right Hon. Stanley Baldwin hopes to visit Canada at the end of July, unless the political situation in England develops dramatically. His visit is not connected with political or trade matters, it is understood.

Labors May Day quietly Celebrated

LONDON, May 1.—Labor's May Day this year, was perhaps the most peaceful and dignified celebration of the day in London since it became the practice to devote the day to Labor demonstrations.

Disorders in Galway

BELFAST, May 1.—Kilmore barracks at Ballinasloe, County Galway, were attacked and wrecked after a preliminary fusillade early to-day. Records books and guards' bicycles and clothing were removed but the occupants of the barracks were not molested.

Five Killed in Gasoline Explosion

KANSAS CITY, Mo., May 1.—Five persons were killed and several injured by a gasoline explosion at the plant of the Interstate Refineries here, shortly before noon to-day.

64 Bodies of Miners are Found

WHEELING, W. Va., May 1.—Sixty four bodies of victims of Monday's explosion in Benwood mine have been found by rescue workers up to noon to-day, leaving forty four miners unaccounted for.

American Flyer, Major Martin, is Again Missing

SEATTLE, May 1.—Radio advices received at five a.m. to-day from the Alaskan Peninsula stated that no traces had been found of Mayor Martin in his flag-plane Seattle, which left Chignik yesterday for Dutch Harbor, Unalaska Island. Fishing boats are searching for the missing plane.

May Day in Russia

MOSCOW, May 1.—Bolshevik Russia to-day departed from the usual custom of observing May Day with parades of units from the Red Army and navy, confining the celebration to a peaceful demonstration at the tomb of Lenin.

LATEST

ATLANTA, May 2.—Reports gathered placed the total death list at 113 in tornadoes that swept thru seven Southern states Tuesday. There still was no definite estimate of the persons injured but the belief persisted that the number would reach 500. The property damage was greater than at first anticipated. It was announced to-day the only estimate attempted, that of ten million dollars, probably will be eclipsed.

TORONTO, May 2.—Of the \$2,000,000 due from the Home Bank shareholders on the double liability call, the time for payment of which expired to-day, barely \$20,000 had been remitted up to last night. It is expected, however, that a large number of remittances will be received within a day or so.

GENEVA, May 2.—The League of Nations has officially announced the convocation of the fifth annual assembly of the League for September 1st, in Geneva.

ATHENS, May 2.—The Republic of Greece was inaugurated yesterday with the singing of Solon's Te Deum in the Cathedral.

WINNIPEG, May 2.—If the report of the civil service commission recommending "fifteen per cent increase in basic salaries" of postal workers means the abandonment of the bonus, it will not meet with the approval of the men," according to leading officers of the Postal Federation interviewed here. The increase, it was pointed out, would only benefit those receiving maximum salaries and other workers would receive less than they did with the bonus.

Ironworkers in New York on Strike

NEW YORK, May 1.—More than 3,000 iron workers went on strike to-day demanding closed shop and wage of \$12.00 for an eight hour day instead of \$10.00.

Sydney Police Remove Red Flag From Parade

GLACE BAY, May 1.—A determined stand was taken by the Police authorities here to-day in connection with the carrying of a red flag in the May Day parade. When the parade was formed at its starting point, chief of police, George Costey, went to the scene, surveyed the banners, and noticing at the front of the parade a large red banner ordered it removed from its prominent place. After short lived protests a white banner was substituted and the red banner forced to take a position farther back in the ranks.

TORNADO LEAVES TRAIL OF DESTRUCTION OVER SOUTHERN STATES

95 Dead, 500 Injured and \$10,000,000 Property Damage.

Women and Children Make up Great Part of Those Who Suffered Death in Worst Storm in History.

ATLANTA, May 1.—With ninety-five persons known to be dead, more than a score missing, and about 500 injured, some perhaps fatally, the Southeast set about to-day to relieve the regions stricken yesterday and Tuesday by the worst high tension storm in its history. Tornadoes descending with a devastating violence upon widely separated sections caused damage estimated at \$10,000,000 in seven States, South Carolina, Georgia, Alabama, North Carolina, Virginia, Louisiana, and Arkansas. Women and children make up a large part of the known dead.

ATLANTA, May 1.—Reports of additional deaths from tornadoes in Richmond and Summer Counties, South Carolina, to-day, swelled the list toll to 108 in the storms that struck the Southeastern States yesterday.

Liberals and Laborites May Disagree

LONDON, May 1.—Warm approval of the Budget by Liberal leaders and representatives in Parliament does not imply complete reconciliation between Liberals and Laborites, according to political writers this morning. The effect of the Laborites' attitude towards the party which put them in office and keeps them there still rankles in the breasts of the Liberals, writers say, and forgiveness is to depend on the line Labor takes regarding the Liberal Bill establishing proportional representation, which comes up for its second reading in the House of Commons to-morrow. The Liberal Party meeting, held yesterday, discussed the bill and is reported to have virtually decided upon an ultimatum to the Prime Minister, demanding its passage as the price for continued Liberal support of the Government.

OTTAWA, May 1.—Robert Forke, Progressive Leader, to-day announced he would support the Government budget proposal. In a two hour speech Mr. Forke made it clear he thought the tariff charges were in the right direction and marked the support of the group which he leads.

Dress Pageant at Wembley

LONDON, England, April 30.—(Canadian Press)—Dress and fashion are likely to be strongly represented at the British Empire Exhibition. The Nottingham Lace Federation has erected a pavilion with Jacobean decorations, arranged with separate days, for display-shows daily of gowns, wraps and cloaks showing the value of Nottingham lace as a fabric or adjunct. The South African government will show a film of an ostrich feather dress pageant in two special theatres, which have been constructed as part of the South African pavilion. In the Wool Textile Section there will also be shown gowns, frocks, cloaks, and three-piece suits, manufactured in Yorkshire and dyed by the Bradford process.

"DELAWANA" IS LOST.

HALIFAX, May 1.—The schooner Delawana, Canadian entrant in the first international schooner race held in 1920, in which the Gloucester boat was the winner, was lost to-day off the eastern shore of this province, when her spring stay broke, causing the main mast to crash down and smashing in the stern of the boat. Captain William Cook and crew escaped and made the shore in safety.

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
