WEALTHY U. S. FARMERS  
MOVING INTO NORTH WEST

The Rush to the Provinces—Moving Bag and Baggage to This Side to Become Citizens of Canada, and to Fully Enjoy the Benefits of Our Great Country—Prosperous Farmers Who Wish to Still Further Increase Their Store.

Omaha, Neb., April 25.—There is no diminution in the number of people from Nebraska and Iowa, who are moving to Western Canada to live, and during the first half of April 428 of the very best people of these two states moved, bag and baggage across the border and became citizens of Canada. These 428 immigrants carried with them 79 freight car loads of household goods, and their financial condition can be learned, when it is known that their combined property, every cent of which went into Canada, was \$224,896. And this is the record for only two weeks, the number being further limited by the fact that only those passing through the Omaha gateway are included in this list, which is furnished by the Canadian government agent in this city, W. V. Bennett.

Indeed, the movement from the central west into Western Canada has become so serious that to emigration to that country alone is charged the startling fact, just made public by the census bureau of the United States, that the Middle Western States have not gained in population during the last five years despite the thousands of new settlers which have arrived here from the east. According to this census report, the outgoing settlers just about balanced the incoming ones—and the principal destination of the outgoing settlers was Western Canada.

While Alberta and Saskatchewan receive the greatest number of emigrants from these middle states, Assiniboia and Manitoba both come in for a fair share and even British Columbia is receiving a few of the "movers."

The people going into Canada from Nebraska and Iowa are not those who have made failures of this portion of the country, and are moving along, hoping for something to turn up. On the other hand they are the very best farmers in the whole country, and in most cases are farmers who have just sold their lands down here and are moving to Canada expecting to buy larger farms than they had in this country—and by using only a portion of the money for which they sold out.
