# Rotarian From Oklahoma Aroused Conference as He Discussed Boy Problem

Too Many Half-Time Parents, Declares Vice President Everett W. Hill of Rotary International, Active Promoter of the "Back to School" Movement—Cheered by Delegates—Tuesday Afternoon at the Conference.

## Rotarians Had Social Evening

"Rotarians are a bunch of people who crave action. They want to do, and then to be unrelenting for the accomplishment of that thing," was the manner in which Past District Governor Sexton, of Halifax, summed up the motive force of Rotary during the course of an after-dinner address delivered to Rotarians of the 32nd District last evening at the banquet tendered to visiting Rotarians and Rotary Annes by the members of the local club.

The subject of Rotary as a World Force. "People must have been more decent than we would have given them credit," he said, "when they had it in them to do these things but didn't know the way." Rotary was like a panting engine on a railroad track ready to carry trains of good works to their destination.

"I think we are all better than we give ourselves credit for," he continued, "especially the other fellow." Speaking of the individual bias of opinion of life obtained through the practice of the different professions, Rotarian Sexton referred to the fact that the majority companies reported 80 per cent of their customers to be honest. Business is cleaner and surer to-day than ever before, he said, and what is more it is headed in this direction.

Rotarian Charles Hunt, of St. John's, Nfld., during the course of an informal and witty address said that he came from Newfoundland and had no apology to offer. "He also came from the Newfoundland Legislature and did apologize." Speaking seriously for a moment he assured his audience that the present mess in Newfoundland would shortly be cleared up, and cleared up in a real fashion. He conveyed the greetings of the St. John's club, remarking that St. John's was the oldest city on this side of the Atlantic, having been discovered in 1497, and was to-day in much the same state—from a moral standpoint. In other respects it was the most progressive and only city of Newfoundland.

The gathering was one of the most pleasant and successful of its kind ever held in Fredericton. The setting Governor Dr. H. L. Spangler, of St. John, presided, and a most successful programme was carried out under his supervision. Music throughout the evening was provided by the members of the Troubadours Orchestra. Dr. Russell Dain, George W. Brown, Frank Thomas and Alvin L. Cooper, supplied a number of quartette numbers of original variety, while Mrs. E. Allison Mackay rendered a solo which was highly appreciated.

W. D. Genter, sergeant-at-arms, was formally introduced and presented with the symbol of office, a huge bottle, and the members of the club were also presented as the symbol of the "baby club." A special radio feature was introduced in the reception of a number of selections and announcements from "station WHAT." Rotarian R. B. Vandine, the champion long-distance sleeper of Fredericton, was presented with an alarm clock for immediate use by Rotarian E. Allison Mackay on behalf of the Fredericton Club. A bottle of offences were penalized by Rotarian Ken MacRae, of St. John, who presided as fines' master for the evening.

Two beautiful bouquets, concealed in baskets which were lowered from the ceiling at a prearranged signal, were presented to Mrs. H. L. Spangler, of St. John, and Mrs. R. B. Vandine, the wives of the presiding District Governor and the rotating President of the Fredericton Club. Dancing was carried out in the auditorium of the Memorial Church Hall following the conclusion of the programme and a last list in the banquet hall.

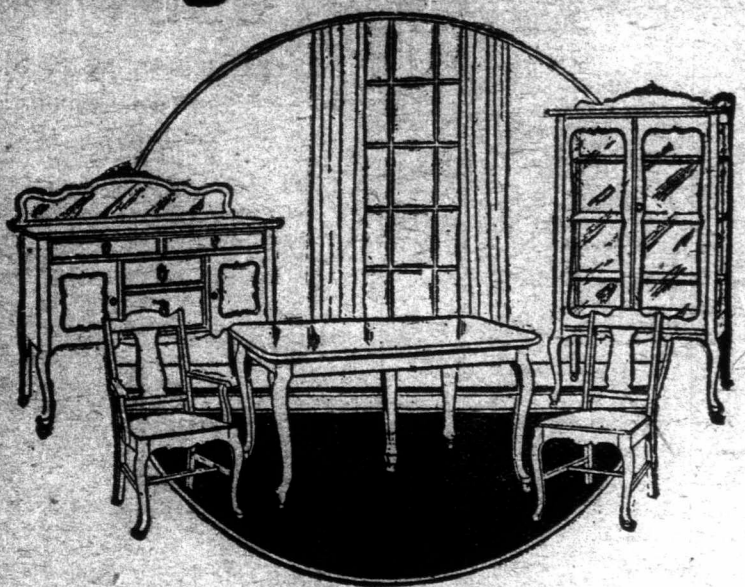
Mrs. H. A. Gailley and little daughter, Virginia, have returned from a visit to relatives in St. Stephen.
