

## PROPOSED SHOE FACTORY

Efforts Being made to have Necessary Capital Subscribed in Chatham.

### ANOTHER PROPOSITION.

The Promoters Called a Meeting for Tuesday night in order to Explain Matters.

(Chatham World)

Messrs. J. E. Groat, E. A. Libby, and H. E. Mitchell, of Keene, N. H., are here to assist in the organization of the Boot and Shoe Company in aid of which a loan of \$20,000 has been voted by the town and authorized by the legislature. They wish to meet the subscribers to stock, and all others interested in the organization of the company, at which meeting they will submit a proposition. It is desirable that a full attendance be had. The meeting will be held in the courtroom at the Town Hall on Tuesday evening next at 8 o'clock. About \$11,000 of the \$20,000 required was subscribed last winter, and when some of the subscribers expressed dissatisfaction with the terms proposed by the promoters Mr. Groat, said two or three persons had offered to supply the total capital. It appears that these capitalists have failed to do so, and now Mr. Groat, and his associates are making a more favorable offer than at first, and are asking local men to subscribe the necessary capital. They had been studying the prospects of such an industry in this town in all its bearings, and are convinced that it would pay good dividends on the money invested. They are practical boot and shoe men, and see their way clear to avoid the rocks on which other factories of the kind have been wrecked. There should be a good meeting, Tuesday night, and everybody with a hundred dollars or so to invest in a local industry should attend.

## RECORD BROKEN

For the past two winters Mr. Mitchell held the post of missionary in the Nazareth St. Mission, Montreal, where he was associated with the Rev. John McKay, the talented pastor of Crescent St., in connection with which church the mission is operated.

## ENGLAND'S NAVY.

Big Battleship Launched—Turbine Engines to be Adopted

London, May 20.—The first class battleship Africa, of 16,350 tons, was launched at Chatham dockyard to-day. She is of the King Edward VII type.

Glasgow, May 20.—The British Admiralty has invited engineering firms here to make tenders for the construction of turbine engines intended for the new battleships to be built in the government dockyards. The specifications demand that the engines develop 2,300 horse-power.

## ELECTRICITY.

AS A PURIFYING AGENT FOR FOOD PRODUCTS.

How modern science is utilising nature's powerful agent to prove our food.

We have been so accustomed in the past to hearing almost weekly of some new and marvellous development in the field of electrical science, that we are now not greatly surprised at any new mechanical application of electricity—the wireless telegraphy, the telephone, electric motor and the marvellous X Rays.

The quality is improved as well as the appearance, the purified flour is freed from every particle of the non-nutritive portions of the wheat, viz: the bran particles, leaving only a perfect flour containing the greatest amount of nutriment in its most easily assimilable form which makes a bread silvery white in color, pure, wholesome and delicious to the taste.

Many of the leading scientists in Great Britain, France and other countries were at first disinclined to accept the claims made as to the benefits to be derived from the electrical process of purifying flour, but subsequent, thorough and extensive experiments, covering a period of over two years, have conclusively shown that these electrical processes not only purify but sterilize and improve the various other qualities of flour and similar food products.

That the patents covering these processes are valuable, is evidenced by the extensive litigation in which the various patentees are involved in both England and the United States, from which it is disclosed the fact that practically every large and important mill in both countries has adopted some one or other of the various patented systems in his mills and this is perhaps the most conclusive evidence of the merit of the process.

In view of the apparent great improvement in the wholesomeness and nutritive qualities of flour by use of these inventions, it is hoped that it may not be long before every miller will adopt the electrical system of purification. The great growing question of the day is the purification of food products, therefore everything that contributes to that end is hailed as a boon to humanity. No expense should be spared to bring every food product to the highest possible degree of purity.
