Sugar to be Fixed
At 12-12 Cents

2 Montreal, Sept. 3.—The Board of
Commerce will probably fix a maxi-
mum price for sugar for both the
wholesalers and retailer within the
next day or two in order to mitigate
the effects of the alarmist statements
that were sent out from the whole-
sale grocers' convention recently,
that sugar would go to eighteen or
more cents a pound in the near fu-
ture, it was learned here to-day.

The probability is that the maxi-
mum price for the wholesalers will
be 11½ cents a pound and that the re-
tailers will be allowed to charge one
cent per pound more than the whole-
sale price, plus the freight charges
as fixed by the standardized freight
rate book issued every six months.
The price which the wholesaler will
pay will be the same as he pays the
refiners, as he is allowed a five per
cent discount on his order, and the
general rule will be that the retail-
er is allowed double the amount of
the discount allowed the wholesaler,
to count as his profit and to pay for
the cost of storing and parcelling the
sugar out.

To Investigate Profits

Ottawa, Sept. 4.—The Board of Com-
merce is forthwith to investigate pro-
fits on necessities of life. According
to a ruling of the board to-day the
special object of the inquiry shall be
to accumulate evidence for the pur-
pose of ascertaining what (with al-
lowance in each case for locality)
shall be deemed to be fair profits and
to fix a date after which the taking
of profits in excess of a rate to be
determined shall be deemed unfair
under the Combines and Fair Prices
Act.

The enquiry will embrace all mat-
ters which incidentally arise or
which indicate the breach of any pro-
vision of the act or any other or
antecedent laws, orders or regula-
tions.
The chief commissioner Judge Rob-
son and Commissioner O'Connor are
authorized individually to report to
the board, each of the said commis-
sioners sitting for said purposes at
such time and place as he shall de-
termine.

Maritime Board
Of Trade

The 21st Annual Meeting of the
Maritime Board of Trade will be held
on Wednesday and Thursday, 17th
and 18th inst., in the City Hall, Mon-
ton, N. B., commencing at 9.30 a. m.

A number of the smaller Boards
have failed to respond to the invita-
tion to send delegates, and it is
strongly urged that their members
be called together and the matter
properly placed before them. The fortunes of
the three Provinces are so closely
bound together that what affects one
affects all—they sink or swim to-
gether. Their natural products, with
the exception possibly of lumber,
fish and apples, must find their prin-
cipal market in the near-by towns
and cities, and anything adversely
affecting the prosperity of the latter
must inevitably react on the farmer.
The smaller Boards as directly re-
presenting the producer and shipper
should therefore be fully represented
at this meeting.
