Roman Intelligence.

Rome, Jan. 14, 1884.

The Monitor de Rome has the following

very important notes: "The Standard

(London) recently announced the resump-

tion of diplomatic relations between the

Holy See and England. It may be

saferly imagined with what aim this ex-

aggerated and premature news is put

before the public. Besides, the fact that

Mr. Errington has not been received by

the Holy Father, on the occasion of the

Christmas truce, at the same time the

Diplomatic Corps, is a formal denial to

the assertions of the Standard."

The first division of the tripartite de-

monstration of Italian patriotism on the

twenty-fifth anniversary of the "resur-

rection" of this new kingdom, marched

in procession from the station at Santa

Maria Maggiore to the Pantheon, on

Wednesday last, 9th January, the sixth

anniversary of Victor Emmanuel's death.

The weather, which on the previous day

had been exceptionally many was favor-

able for a splendid display of the 24,000

patriots who, according to the Monar-

chical journals, were eager to demon-

strate their presence in this procession

their adherence to the House of Savoy.

Least the crowd should be too numerous

for the resources of Rome, this demon-

stration has been divided into three

parts. The railway fares have been re-

duced seventy-five per cent, and special

privileges have been granted to the

"pilgrims"—distinguished as they have

been by a bronze medal attached by a

green ribbon, in the centre of which is

the white five-pointed star of Italy. Yet

with all this the total number of arrivals,

excluding those from the Roman Pro-

vince, has been only 6,527. These were

joined by pilgrims from Rome and

those who came from the outlying little

cities, such as Trivoli, Rocca di Papa,

Civita, Vechia, &c., adding about three

or four thousand more to the procession.

Mr. Biggar and the Police Magistrate.

AN AMUSING SCENE.

The correspondent of the Dublin Eco-

nomist writes:

An extraordinary scene was witnessed

at Blacklion on the occasion of the visit

of Mr. Biggar, M. P., who travelled by a

special route from Enniskillen to

Blacklion, the journey being twenty-six

Irish miles over a mountain road, the

direct route being only twelve miles.

When some miles from Blacklion the

road divided into two, and Mr. Biggar

took the new road, but he was still four

miles from Blacklion when he was met

by Captain McTernan, R. M., and about

a dozen policemen on cars. Mr. McTer-

nan immediately wheeled around and

drove towards Blacklion at a somewhat

rapid pace. Mr. Biggar went more

slowly, and as he came near the town

the people who had gathered in large

numbers, and had been dispersed

several times by the police, began to

assemble on the road. A considerable

contingent of men on horseback were

halted from the old road, and they im-

mediately wheeled over by the horse and

joined Mr. Biggar's party unseen by the

police, who by this time had gone into

town and were doing their utmost to

scatter the people, with what result will

be seen hereafter. Meanwhile several

hundred men, who had been waiting

in a field near Blacklion, and soon

afterwards to the place where Mr. Biggar

and Mr. Jordan, of Enniskillen, who

accompanied him, had been halted. The

stream of people flocking in this direc-

tion, however, had not escaped the obser-

vation of Capt. McTernan, and Mr. Biggar

was warned that Captain McTernan

was on his track, and that an address was

to be delivered it should be delivered at

once.
