BIG FOREST FIRES AGAIN BREAK OUT

Towns of Beaudette and Spooner, Burned Last Fall, in Danger. Great Loss is Probable Unless the Rain Comes Soon.

Minnesota, May 7.—Forest fires in upper Minnesota, from the neighborhood of Beaudette eastward and north to the Rainy River, are doing considerable damage and threatening villages such as Beaudette and Spooner.

Laporte, Ind., May 7.—Forest fires are raging throughout this locality and several settlers living a few miles southwest of this village have suffered total losses.

The Minnesota and International passenger train was badly scorched by the flames between Laporte and LaPorte. The smoke is so dense in the fire district that it is almost impossible to travel the roads.

Brainerd, Minn., May 7.—Swamp fires several miles south of Brainerd were started by an old farmer who was burning brush in his yard.

Duluth, Minn., May 7.—Forest and brush fires have become general in northwestern Minnesota. Fire reports are coming in from many points along the Rainy River.

At Short Line park forty men are busy fighting the fire. The smoke is so dense that the sun is obscured from Duluth. It is 15 miles from Duluth, and is raging between Troy and Elevator.

BUENOS AYRES MAN TELLS OF GROWTH OF ARGENTINE REPUBLIC

Thomas Jewell, Looking Over Conditions in the Edmonton District Speaks of Modern South America—Buenos Ayres, a City of 1,800,000 People, Increased by 300,000 in Five Years Through Immigration—Conditions of the Argentine Republic.

Ernest Jewell, of Buenos Ayres, is spending a few days in Alberta, looking over conditions in the Edmonton district. Mr. Jewell was born in the Argentine and his father was one of the first exporters of wheat in Santa Fe, Argentina.

For farm power oxen, horses, mules, steam and gasoline tractors are used. The average field of the small settler is 200 acres. The hard wood forests are also a resource. The country provides an extra used in lumber in America and Germany.

The grain is marketed in bags. There are no elevators except at the seaports. The cars are used for grading the export grain.

Mr. Jewell was educated in England. He has spent most of his life in Argentina, and he is a native speaker of Spanish.

Courts Above Repealed. The government is getting better every year. The federal courts are absolutely above reproach. Nobody pays attention to the small provincial elections. The people take little interest in the elections.

Some wheat is ground into flour which is shipped to Brazil. Wine is made from the fruit of the vineyard. Sugar cane is grown in the province of Tucuman.

As an indication of the success of an Argentine citizen Mr. Jewell mentioned that Dr. Drago was one of the arbitrators in the Newfoundland fishery dispute.

A transcontinental railway has been completed from Buenos Ayres to Valparaiso with a tunnel through the Andes. Buenos Ayres has now a population of 1,800,000, an increase of 300,000 in the last five years, due to immigration.

Mr. Jewell has only spent about ten days in Alberta, but his impressions so far are favorable. He returns to Argentina, sailing on the 19th. He could not say anything definite regarding investing in Alberta lands.

Lloyd George's Insurance Scheme. London, May 8.—A senator, Lloyd George interviewed, said a special arrangement for the insurance of the small property owners in the country is being made between this country and the Dominion. If the latter start their own scheme, which will give them all the advantages they are willing to concede us.

Vandal Destroys Military Stores. Port Arthur, May 8.—Some person supposed to have a grievance against the military authorities, destroyed a store room here and with a knife slashed over the heads of all the bugle band drums, six in number. It is expected that arrests will be made.

Mr. McAlpine had been missing from his residence for a fortnight. The body shows no signs of violence and the police describe the death as heart failure. A post mortem examination will be held. He was a single man, 40 years of age, and came here from St. Augustine, Scotland, about six years ago. He was secretary of the Calgary Bowling club and well known to lovers of that sport.
