Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—One rarely hears any talk of the Girls' Orphanage at Belvidere, and few are intimately acquainted with the wonderful work that is being so successfully carried out in this institution. This is accounted for, I presume, by the reticence of the good Nuns who prefer doing their work silently. It was by meeting a friend who knew the facts, that I discovered that there are one hundred and thirty Orphan girls at Belvidere, and I need hardly say that I was very much surprised. In fact, I believe, there are very few in the community who know that such is the case. If we consider for a moment what it means to clothe and feed that number of children, for a year, we will realize to some extent the large outlay that it demands, and as the Nuns are to a very large extent dependent upon the proceeds of the Annual Collection, it behooves us all to do our very best in order that they may be placed in a position to carry on the noble work to which they have devoted their lives. The duty to help the Orphanage falls not alone on the Catholics of the City, it applies to the Outports also, for outport children who lose their parents are looked after by this institution. Therefore everyone in the Outports who are in a position to help should realize their responsibility and send in their contributions, large or small, to the Reverend Mother. A big effort must be made on Sunday next to make this year's collection by far the largest on record, because as we all know food and clothing and coal have advanced to a large extent since the war began. The cost of school books and all other school requisites has increased also, and in order that the Nuns carry on their educational work to fit the Orphans for the battle of life there must be no stone left unturned to assist them. Therefore with these facts before us, I feel sure that we will all do our very best on Sunday next and make the collection one that will bring joy to the Orphans and encouragement to those good ladies who devote their lives to such a noble undertaking.

Let each and everyone of us do our best, and, when the result of Sunday's collection is made known we will all share in the joy that comes to those who realize that they have done their duty.

Still at Large.

Though no further report of the Halifax trawler "Triumph", captured by a German sub and converted into a commerce raider, have been received, it is known that the vessel is still at large, but has ceased operations for the present, presumably because the German fear that the loss of their recent sinking is not safe for them. Halifax shipping men are conjecturing the ultimate fate of the "Triumph" if not captured shortly. Some members of the crew of a sunken schooner who landed somewhere on the Nova Scotia Coast, Thursday morning, say that they believe it will be an easy matter to recapture or sink the trawler, as she is not speedy, her limit being ten knots. As her coal supply is nearing exhaustion her speed will be much less, and she should fall an easy prey to an armed patrol. Some suggestions have been made that notwithstanding her lack of speed it is possible for her to hold up passing steamships and transfer the much needed coal from the victims bunkers to her own. Hops, however, is expressed that the raider will shortly cease from troubling unarmed and helpless fishermen; her capture now being merely a matter of hours.
