RECOMMENDS LABOR DEPART-The chair occupied by President White, the N. I. W. A. met last even-ing to debate the question of creat-ing a Department of Labor. Presi-

dent White pointed out that questions as the 8 hour day, labor, the minimum wage, etc., could best be dealt with by such a department to which there ought to be attached a board similar to those working in connection with the Fisheries Works department. Such departments of labor in other countries had proved of great value. At present the matter of strikes is nobody's business, and the establishment of such a department would be beneficial to the entire country.
Mr. J. T. Meaney followed,

that the establishment of the department was so necessary as to be selfing labor to the fore in government bodies in other countries. Revolutions which have shaken the earth to its centre have not produced such lasting good for the masses as evolu-tion in social and industrial conditions.
