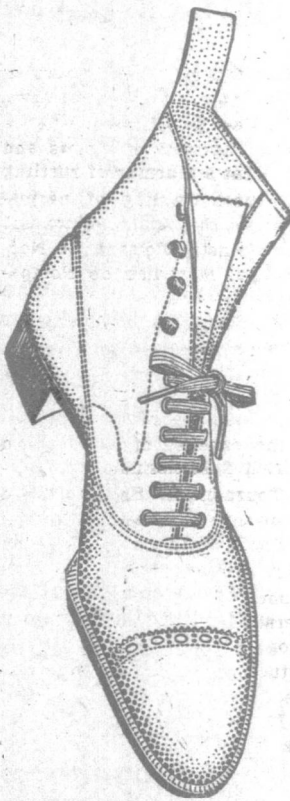

Early Morning Fire

LAUNDRY AT POOR ASYLUM DAMAGED.

The Central and West End Fire Companies received a call from box 335 at 12.30 this morning to the laundry at the rear of the Poor Asylum, where a slight blaze was in progress. When the firefighters arrived on the scene huge smoke clouds were issuing

from the windows on the second flat, while the woodwork surrounding the chimney was in a blaze. After much difficulty the firemen managed to get the hose wagon up Poor House Lane, which was the only means of gaining access to the burning building. A line of hose was quickly run out, and before much damage was done to the structure, the flames were extinguished. A quantity of clothes, ranged around on racks on the second floor, were totally destroyed. The origin of the fire was probably due to an overheated furnace. Although the icy streets leading to the scene of the fire were in a treacherous condition, the firemen made a speedy response.
