MONTREAL, Dec. 10-Formation of new conference by Canadian shipping interests known as "The Canadian Trans-Atlantic Conference has been consummated, announcement to this effect being made by Major P. A. Curry, President of the executive committee, of the new organization and General Manager in Montreal of the White Star Dominion Steamship Line. The new conference will have jurisdiction only over eastbound Canadian and American freight from the St. Lawrence route and Maritime Province ports to United Kingdom and Europe. It will not have jurisdiction over westbound freight or cattle rates, and all passengers traffic will be dealt with from across the Atlantic.

Although the Canadian body will in no way be connected with existing North Atlantic conferences, Major Curry pointed out that there was no ill-feeling.
